Abstract: The collection consists of an article and notes.

Historical Notes: Around the turn of the twentieth century, a group of Chicago Methodists, caught up in the enthusiasm of the growing Holiness movement and its new Pentecostal wing, organized a reform organization called the Metropolitan Church Association. In 1902, members of the group began moving toward fixing up their private property and founding an intentional community. In the winter of 1905-06, members began to move to a huge resort hotel the movement had purchased in Waukesha, Wisconsin. By 1912, over 500 persons were living there. At that point, the movement decided to spread its message in a new part of the country and purchased 1,520 acres of land with a large house near Bullard in eastern Texas. In 1913, some 375 church members arrived to build a colony, and soon erected homes and a large tabernacle. The members were by and large not prosperous, and even with outside support the colony struggled to survive. Daily life was somber, in the Holiness tradition of avoiding worldly amusement, but the worship services were joyous Pentecostal events. When the business fortunes of a chief benefactor, Duke Farson, turned and he was unable to provide further subsidies, a local creditor acquired the Texas land and the colonists dispersed in 1919. Economic pressures also forced many members to leave the Waukesha property, and as the membership aged, the whole MCA organization declined.
