**Abstract:** This collection consists of newspaper clippings, event announcements, exhibition catalogs, and a conference paper.

**Historical Notes:** The Transcendental Club, meeting in the 1830's in the Boston area, was an arena for new ideas. One member, George Ripley, with his wife Sophia Ripley, became enamored of utopian communal life, and in 1840 began to organize what became Brook Farm. They secured a 170-acre farm on the Charles River in West Roxbury, then eight miles from Boston. In April 1841, the first 15 to 20 residents moved in and soon set up the school for which the community would later be renowned. Others arrived later; the population eventually exceeded 100, and several residential and other buildings were erected. In 1843, when Fourierism was attracting many followers in America, Brook Farm reorganized as a Fourierist phalanx. Members began building the phalanstery, or unitary residence, that such a system required; but just as it was being completed it burned to the ground on March 3, 1846.
