When addressed to points where micro-film equipment is in use, the weight of mail to and from the persons of our Armed Forces outside the continental United States, a miniature photographic negative of the message will be made and sent by the most expeditious form of transportation available for reproduction and delivery. Messages addressed to or from points where micro-film equipment is not in operation will be transmitted in their original form by the most expeditious means available.
