

JOHN SCHUTZ ELECTED **ALUMNI ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT**



The USI Alumni Association presented its annual Faculty Recognition, Distinguished Alumni, and Special Recognition awards at the May 12 reception and dinner honoring the 1989 graduates. The 1989 awards were presented to:



Distinguished Alumni Award -Dr. Cynthia D. Alexander, anesthesiologist with Methodist Medical Center of Illinois in Peoria. A 1973 USI graduate, she attended the Medical College of Wisconsin, receiving

the Doctor of Medicine in 1979. Dr. Alexander is in demand as a speaker and is a writer and researcher, primarily in the field of anesthesiology. In 1986, she wrote the chapter, "In the Real World," for the book, Ambulatory Surgery, and now is writing a chapter for the second edition. She also is conducting a pilot study for Stuart Pharmaceuticals Company on the use of Diprivan for outpatient anesthesiology. This is the third study Dr. Alexander has conducted on the state-of-the-art drug expected to be approved soon by the Federal Drug Administration. She and her husband, Sam Nkana, have three children, Ethan, 5; Enoh, 4; and Emmanuel, 2. She is the daughter of Helen Alexander Landrum, 818 SE Eighth Street, Evansville.



Special Recognition Award - Mr. Robert L. Koch, Evansville industrialist and civic leader. Mr. Koch, an honorary alumnus of USI, received the Doctor of Civil Law degree from the University in 1973. His civic endeavors have

included serving as chairman and president of Southern Indiana Higher Education, Inc., and leading the 1966 fund drive that raised nearly a million dollars to acquire the land for the Mid-America University Center on which USI is located. A legacy of USI support has grown under SIHE's guidance, resulting in the establishment of scholarship endowments and the development of student housing and a fraternity row. Mr. Koch also was a member of the original 25-member Indiana State-Evansville site selection advisory committee. An Evansville native, he was president of George Koch Sons, Inc., for 27 years prior to becoming chairman of the board nine years ago.



Faculty Recognition Award Dr. Charles J. Bertram. professor of education and mathematics and certification advisor in the School of Education and Human Services. Dr. Bertram has been a USI faculty member since 1969

and was chairman of the Division of Education for 14 years. During his tenure, USI's student teaching program was judged in the top 35 in the country by the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education. Dr. Bertram has been active in numerous professional organizations, including serving as president of the Indiana Council of Teachers of Mathematics and Indiana Library and Historical Board, chairman of the Secondary School Organization Committee for Vanderburgh County, and a member of the Indiana State Board of Education Advisory Committee on Textbook Adoptions. Dr. Bertram received an A.B. degree from the University of Evansville, M.S. degree from Southern Illinois University, and Ed.D. from Indiana University.

RECORD CLASS GRADUATES: THREE HONORED FOR ACHIEVEMENTS

A record number of seniors — 603 — were eligible to receive diplomas with the Class of '89, a class which also boasted three members graduating summa cum laude. Earning perfect 4.0 averages entitling them to share highest honors were business education major Tina Alldredge, marketing major Lisa Nance, and biology major Jane Weaver. During the ceremony, honorary degrees were conferred on D. Mead Johnson, Carolyn Georgette, and U.S. Rep. Lee Hamilton.

Mr. Johnson was recognized for his efforts to establish public higher education in southern Indiana in the early sixties, when he was chairman of Mead Johnson and Company. He now is retired and living in Palm Beach, Florida. His return to Evansville was an opportunity to see the results of a vision he had for his community 25 years ago.

Mrs. Georgette, manager of residence services for Indiana Bell in Evansville, was honored

for her work on both Southern Indiana Higher Education's Board and the Board of Incorporators for an Independent State University in Southwestern Indiana, which directed the University's transition from a regional campus to Indiana's sixth state university.

Commencement Speaker and Ninth District Congressman Hamilton told graduates that the U.S. faces the same problems today that were addressed by Abraham Lincoln 100 years ago — how to protect your country and remain a democracy. The answer, he said, demands citizens who are willing to meet "the challenges of a free life" while also being unselfish enough to work for the common good.

Congressman Hamilton received an honorary Doctor of Civil Law degree at the ceremony, in recognition of his outstanding service in the Congress.

SCHOLARSHIP HONORS GRADUATING STUDENT ATHLETE

The Jane Weaver Recognition Award has been established at USI, honoring the 1989 summa cum laude graduate from Fort Wayne, Indiana, who maintained a perfect 4.0 grade point average in her three years at USI. The former captain of the Lady Eagles (1987-88) earned her honors in biology and pre-medical studies and was accepted by the Indiana University School of Medicine. The \$500 Weaver scholarship will be awarded each year an athlete qualifies; criteria include maintaining at least a 3.5 g.p.a., participating in a varsity sport at least two seasons, acceptance in a graduate/professional school, and extracurricular activities. The award was initiated by USI Director of Library Services Bette Walden and her husband, Bill. Contributions to the fund are invited and may be sent to the USI Foundation.

A. WAYNE PLACE ENDOWS PRESIDENTIAL SCHOLARSHIP

A. Wayne Place, chairman of the board of Jasper Rubber Products, Inc., has contributed \$50,000 to a trust in the German American Bank in Jasper, becoming the first to endow a Presidential Scholarship in the USI Foundation program initiated in 1988 to encourage Indiana valedictorians and salutatorians to attend the University.

The trust will support the JARCO—A. Wayne Place Perpetual Presidential Scholarship at USI. Mr. Place plans to add to the trust annually until it reaches the \$75,000 needed for endowment. Dean Bromm, a business administration major, has been selected as the first JARCO Scholarship recipient. He was salutatorian of his class at Southridge High School in Dubois County and had one of the highest SAT scores among Presidential Scholarship applicants the past two years.

Bromm will be among 38 Hoosier valedictorians and salutatorians attending USI this fall through the Presidential Scholarship program. Private donations are placed in a restricted fund in the USI Foundation or in a trust such as Mr. Place chose to use. A commitment of \$4,500 a year for four years will support one scholarship. Such donors or those who endow a scholarship may choose the name of the scholarship, either designating it in the donor's name or as a memorial honor. Donor recognition includes invitations to the annual luncheon to meet scholarship recipients and listing in the annual Honor Roll of Donors.

DARREL BIGHAM RECEIVES DISTINGUISHED PROFESSOR AWARD

ATHLETIC TEAMS SET RECORDS

The USI Eagles enjoyed a year of growth and new records in University athletic programs that have an almost totally new coaching lineup.

The baseball Eagles under Coach Gary Redman ended a successful season ranked 22nd in the nation in the Collegiate Baseball Top 30 Division II, setting a new school record for wins (30), among others. The Eagles earned a bid to the NCAA Division II North Central Regional, where Mankato State and Lewis ousted them in double-elimination competition.

The basketball Eagles, coached by Dr. Lionel Sinn, finished their season 15-13, with sophomore center llo Mutombo setting a new single-season field goal percentage mark — 127 for 219 from the field for a .626 shooting percentage. He was selected for GLVC Player of the Week honors.

Shelly Scott, a 5-foot-10 sophomore forward from McCordsville, Indiana, who led the Lady Eagles in scoring (19.8 ppg) and rebounding (10.2), set 15 new individual records with the team and also won GLVC honors. Although it was a disappointing 6-21 season for the Lady Eagles, coached by Felicia Cavallini, they set nine new USI team records in the 1988-89 competition.

The women's softball Eagles finished second in the Great Lakes Valley Conference standings. Their 10-4 record had tied Northern Kentucky for first, but the team lost out on tiebreaking rules. the 1989-90 Distinguished Professor Lecture at the University.


Dr. Bigham's community activities have included work with the Evansville Museum of Arts and Science, Evansville-Vanderburgh Public Library. Evansville Bicentennial Council, Conrad Baker Foundation, Evansville Freedom Festival, and Vanderburgh County Hoosiers for Birch Bayh. During his 1976-77 sabbatical from University, he served half time as executive director during the formative years for Leadership Evansville, Inc., and stayed with the program through 1978. He has been a consultant with the Vanderburgh County Records Preservation Commission; Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation; Southwestern Indiana Council on Aging; Indiana Library Association; National Endowment for the Humanities program reviews; and community leadership programs in Hartford, Connecticut; Terre Haute, Indiana; and Kansas City, Missouri.

FORMER USI TEACHER RETURNS TO JUDGE ART SHOW

Dan Engelke, who was instrumental in the 1970s in establishing ceramic and design programs for the USI Art Department, was the judge for the 1989 Student Art Exhibition in April. Now an associate professor of art at Purdue University, he has won numerous regional and national honors and in recent years created an outdoor sculpture on Lake Michigan, sponsored by Dow Chemical.

Engelke, who spent seven formative years with the USI Art Department, said he had a difficult task in reducing the number of entries in the USI art show to fit the exhibition space and "I was forced to exclude a significant number of fine works. Your students and faculty are to be commended for the excellent level of art work entered."

More than 30 awards were presented this year, with junior Carol Schneider receiving the \$300 Old National Bank "Best of Show" award for her painting, "Forbidden Fruit." She also received a \$200 USI scholarship sponsored by George Koch Sons Foundation.

GRANTS TO USI FUND RESEARCH AND EXTEND SERVICES TO SOUTHERN INDIANA REGION

Grants from foundations and the private sector are becoming more important to universities throughout the nation as they undertake research projects and assume greater responsibility for solving societal problems. USI has stepped up its requests for grants from governmental agencies, nonprofit foundations, and corporations. In the last fiscal year, more than a million and a half dollars were requested for 37 separate projects, and to date USI has received \$943.142 in grants. The activities funded range from a \$2,492 grant to study Indiana art to a \$272,000 grant to study Indiana history. Two other major grants will enable USI to begin important outreach programs to the southern Indiana community.

"Studies in Indiana Art," was a cooperative project with the Evansville Museum of Arts and Science which was partially funded by the Indiana Committee for the Humanities and directed by David A. Lewis, ISU art historian and instructor in art history. Lewis graduated cum laude from USI in 1981 with majors in art and philosophy.

The ICH awarded \$2,492 toward the project's \$10,000 budget in a student and faculty effort to explore how Hoosier art related to American and European art trends of the 19th and 20th centuries and made use of Hoosier paintings from the Museum collection, including eight works recently conserved with funding from a 1987-88 National Endowment for the Arts grant. It also included a series of forum lectures, which coincided with the exhibition in April and May.

Thirteen USI students participated in the project. Lewis said art history usually is taught "in terms of slides," and he wanted to give his students a taste of how things operate outside academia — "the kind of experience that usually is reserved for graduate students." Most of the students researched two or three artists. Not all the artists were included in the exhibit, but all the research will be organized and placed in Museum and University archives for use by art libraries and museums in other areas.

A \$272,000 grant for the study of Indiana history was the largest single grant awarded by the Division of Education of the National Endowment for the Humanities. It will fund a two-year program of intensive study of southern Indiana history conducted by the Historic Southern Indiana Project.

An 18-member planning committee, chaired by Dr. Darrel E. Bigham, USI professor of history and director of Historic Southern Indiana, will oversee "Indiana and the New Nation: 1776-1876." The committee sets policy and provides implementation support for a program involving 30 Hoosier teachers from public and private elementary, middle, or high schools.

This summer nationally prominent scholars and the 30 teachers met for the first of two summer institutes with a goal of enriching the teachers' understanding of this era of American history and improving the ties between the classroom and southern Indiana's many important historic sites. The institute themes - "Establishing Order on the Trans-Appalachian Frontier, 1776-1825" and "Community Building in Nineteenth Century Indiana, 1814-1876: Contrasting Examples" are suggested by several important historic sites in the southern Indiana region which are an integral part of the learning experience. Participants also will attend fall and winter teaching seminars in which they will explore the teaching implications of the summer experiences. Long-term curricular improvement is a goal of the project, as is the strengthening of teaching, particularly of history, in Indiana. Participating teachers are expected to develop in-service training programs for colleagues in their home school districts.

The Historic Southern Indiana project is a regional alliance organized by the University in the fall of 1986 to preserve historic sites throughout southern Indiana and to promote education, tourism, and development related to the sites. The region is defined as the lower Wabash and Ohio River valleys, with Interstate 64 forming its backbone. The historic sites are seven major centers - Angel Mounds near Evansville, Historic New Harmony, Vincennes, Lincoln City, Corydon, New Albany, and Madison - each of which has a visitors' center and paid staff. They encompass a wide range of important aspects of the history and prehistory of the lower Ohio Valley.

Two new outreach programs will enable USI faculty and staff to extend services to the community with the assistance of granting agencies. A \$240,000 grant from Lilly Endowment, to develop The Extended University concept, reflects goals in the University's mission statement. The grant will give faculty members an opportunity to develop programs in the community and region relating to their areas of expertise. Divided over a three-year period, the Endowment grant will be used to encourage faculty members to employ their professional expertise in assisting regional social service agencies, governmental agencies, and

business and industry. The University goal is to strengthen its commitment to the concepts of applied research, technical support, and services in the region to reciprocate the support the University has received.

This project will build on three major programs already started by the University in cooperation with community groups - the Historic Southern Indiana Project; the Management Diagnostic Center, which assists area business, industry, and individuals in developing management potential; and the Southern Indiana Labor-Management Education Forum, which is promoting labormanagement cooperation. According to Dr. M. Edward Jones, associate vice president for Academic Affairs and director of Extended Services, the Endowment grant will give the University the flexibility to allow faculty members to share their expertise beyond the classroom. Among projects already suggested, he said, are a network of youth and college-age volunteers for social agencies; helping area business and industry compete in a global economy; and technical assistance on solid waste management.

The Gateway Project, another outreach effort,

will be funded by three grants totaling \$101,040 from the City of Evansville's Department of Metropolitan Development, the Private Industry Council, and Whirlpool Corporation. It will assist disadvantaged inner-city residents in preparing for entry into college.

Gateway will be operated in St. John's School in downtown Evansville. USI will enlist the advice and assistance of community organizations to locate and assist people who have potential to benefit from remedial programs preparing them for college entry and more productive employment. The goal is to provide such services as entry assessment, career and life counseling, and development classes in an accessible, nonthreatening setting. Child care will be made available by the Community Action Program of Evansville (CAPE).

Aiding the direction of Gateway are representatives of the Evansville Black Coalition, NAACP, Private Industry Council, Evansville Urban Enterprise Association, Carver Community Organization, CAPE, Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation, IVY Tech, and USI. Kandace Hinton will direct USI's Gateway Project.

USI THEATRE RI

Theatrical opportunities abound at USI since the School of Liberal Arts accepted requests to manage New Harmony Theatre and the summer musical outdoor drama, "Young Abe Lincoln," at Lincoln State Park. The two have been added to the USI Theatre program, giving the students opportunities for varied theatre experience that includes working with professional actors and directors.

USI's involvement in these theatre projects stems from its management of Historic New Harmony and its leadership in tourism promotion through the Historic Southern Indiana Project, which seeks to preserve and promote historic sites accessible from Interstate 64.

"Theatre from the Heart" is the theme for New Harmony Theatre's 1989 season, which Dr. James R. Blevins, dean of the School of Liberal Arts, said "will celebrate the human spirit in keeping with the New Harmony setting." The season opened in June with "Foxfire," a gentle and loving tribute to the Georgia country folks whose sturdiness and character the play celebrates. The July production was "Man of La Mancha," a special combination of Don Quixote's idealism and some of the most stirring songs of the American musical theatre.

"The Dining Room," a richly humorous theatrical tour de force which delineates the life styles of a succession of generations, will be presented August 4-27; "Road to Mecca," a testimony to the resiliency of the human spirit, will be presented September 8-October 1; and the final production, "Dark of the Moon," an American classic which captures the essence of rural America, will be presented October 13-29.

The directors for the five productions include W. L. "Rusty" Mundell, a recent addition to the USI faculty who also is directing "Young Abe Lincoln;" Steve Williford, who won the New York City Theatre's 1988 Director's Festival with a production of George Bernard Shaw's "Overruled;" Leon Fougnies, who has retired to his native Princeton, Indiana, after a career in academic theatre in the Midwest; and Brian Sajko, USI communications instructor.

Mundell has accepted a three-year position on the USI faculty and, besides "Young Abe" and New Harmony Theatre work, will direct a USI Theatre production and teach. He is a writer, director, and producer of outdoor dramas in Ohio, Kentucky, and Minnesota; formerly was a writer for the "Wild Kingdom" television series; and was casting director for the TV miniseries, "Centennial." He helped found the nonprofit association in 1970 that created "Tecumseh," an outdoor drama in Chilicothe, Ohio.

Mundell was producer and artistic director for that theatre for 17 years and directed the show for seven seasons. He also wrote and directed "Blue Jacket," a Xenia, Ohio, outdoor drama, and wrote "Viking," a show presented in Park Rapids, Minnesota.

When USI Alumni enroll in a course offered by the USI Continuing Education Office they will receive a 10% discount on the price of the course.

Noncredit courses are taught in a noncompetitive atmosphere where interest in learning is the primary consideration. No grades are assigned, no academic credit is given, and formal admission to the University is not required. BRITISH STAMP TO FEATURE NEW LANARK MILLS

The old cotton mills at New Lanark, Scotland, are a feature of a four-stamp British postage series issued in early July, focusing on landmarks of the 18th century Industrial Revolution. The New Lanark operation was run by Robert Owen, a Welshman who later purchased the town of New Harmony from its founder, Father George Rapp. Other stamps in the British series feature the world's first iron bridge at Coalbrooksdale in Shropshire, the first tin mine at St. Agnes in Cornwall, and the 1,000-foot Pontcysylle Aqueduct near Llangollen in Wales.

Owen, an industrious young man, was rapidly improving his station in life when he purchased the Scottish mills from his future father-in-law. He introduced labor reforms that raised eyebrows among British industrialists - treating workers humanely, establishing schools for employees' children, and paying workers when the mill was closed by a supply shortage. The experiment was a success and the mills returned a handsome profit. Owen had become a wealthy man when his restless spirit led him to the purchase of New Harmony to establish a perfect society based on universal education. The experiment was less successful than the New Lanark Mills but brought many educators and professionals to frontier Indiana who left a legacy of eduction and progress that continues to have an impact on New Harmony and southern Indiana

MID-AMERICA SINGERS TAKE SHOW TO NATION'S CAPITAL

USI's Mid-America Singers traveled to Washington, D.C., in April to participate in America Sings '89, joining 14,000 other young performers from across the country. The America Sings event included a PBSproduced extravaganza with all groups performing at the Lincoln Memorial. The Mid-America Singers performed alone in a concert at the Capitol Building. The Singers are directed by Sue Schriber and perform throughout Indiana.

Uebelhor received an M.F.A. from Southern Illinois University-Carbondale and is exhibits preparator at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art, which is managed by USI. His winning photo combines his early interest in mail art — art exchanged via postal delivery — with his more recent work in miniature three-dimensional satirical dioramas that employ toy furniture and figures. He won a \$300 cash award and inclusion in the postcard package. Another of his entries won a merit award in the competition.
