## ALLIED HEALTH PROGRAMS

The Department of Allied Health offers four programs in health related fields. They are Dental Assisting, Dental Hygiene, Respiratory Therapy and Radiologic Technology.

Certificates were granted to sixteen students of the Dental Assisting Program at the graduation exercise in May of this year. This was the third class to graduate since the program was established. The Dental Assisting Curriculum was revised considerably this past year. College credit is now given and general education courses of English, speech and psychology have been added. Thirteen graduates of the second class of Dental Hygiene received associate degrees this year and four students will be granted a Bachelor of Science degree with a major in Dental Hygiene.

To be considered for membership in Pi Omega Pi a candidate must have the expressed intention of becoming a teacher of business education, be a sophomore, junior or senior in the upper 35 per cent of his class with an average grade of B or better in all courses in business and education, and have earned a 3.3 grade point average in their major field of study.

A steering committee is currently directing the activities of the local chapter during the probationary period. Dr. Dona F. Frost is serving as faculty advisor to the local chapter with Renita Moss, Robyn Schoenenberger, Sheila Jones, and Roiann Lane functioning as members of the steering committee.

Members of the Accounting Club are afforded opportunities to exchange information and ideas related to the field of accounting, to listen to speakers concerned with various phases of accounting, to promote the high standards of accounting, and to


provide interaction among students and persons in the field of accounting.



Mr. Dale N. Shook will serve as faculty advisor to the newly formed group.








# UNIVERSITY CENTER SOON TO BE HUB OF CAMPUS

The University Bookstore personnel are packing books instead of unpacking them. The Alumni Affairs Office is stacked high with cardboard boxes and student organizations are making plans for new work space. And they all are waiting for the move to the University Center.

To be completed this summer, the University Center will become the focal point of the campus as it will house the food service areas including a grill and a cafeteria; the University Bookstore; work space for student organizations; and several student service offices.

Designed to complement the Library building, the University Center was begun in November, 1972. The University Center and Library are linked by the Continuing Education Wing (see picture upper left). The Continuing Education Wing has been developed so that it can be one large room or converted to four multi-purpose rooms.

The view from the upper level of the University Center takes in a sweeping look at



Reflection Lake and the south area of campus. It will become a favorite spot for students and guests alike.

The glass entrance to the University Center gives a clear view of the bright red, purple and orange accent colors to be used throughout the building. A monumental staircase, like the Library staircase, is planned for the entry way.

Construction has also begun on a parking bay for the University Center. With this bay complete, the University will be able to accommodate 1880 motor vehicles. The parking bay is built adjacent to the current lots and swings around in an arc on the south end of campus.

South of the University Center construction is also underway for the Classroom Applied Science Technology Building to be completed next year.

# Pre-professional Group Benefits by Judy Rogers Student Teachers

The Student Education Association, according to Karen Koch, the 1974 Spring semester president and 1974 graduate, is a pre-professional organization for students who are interested in the teaching profession. Goals of the organization are mainly to pass on information to students about teaching and to work with and meet other students and people already in the profession. During the past year, the SEA conducted tours of campus for Future Teachers of America clubs from local high schools and answered questions the high school students had about college. SEA members also benefit by receiving valuable training in working with various programs.

A recently developed program at ISUE has been the tutoring program. Approximately 15 to 20 interested education majors signed up for tutoring in their particular areas. They found that most students needing tutoring are not those ill or handicapped, but ones who simply need help in certain subjects. The fee for this service is nominal, usually \$2.50 per hour, but if the individual to be tutored cannot afford that fee, the students usually

tutor them for no charge. The money earned goes to the student who does the tutoring.

The Student Education Association was organized at ISUE by J. Maxwell Davis, Associate Professor of Life Science, in 1969, and is an active growing organization. Mr. Davis, as Coordinating Sponsor, gives assistance in many ways. Faculty sponsors, Janet Goodrum, Instructor in Education, and Charles Bertram, Assistant Professor of Mathematics, help the organization by publicizing meetings and supporting the organization. They also attend many of the meetings.

188 students were enrolled in ISUE's Student Education Association this past year. Upon joining, a new member receives an insurance liability policy and several professional newspaper subscriptions and magazines. With new rules to be in effect for the coming year, a student will join at the local, state, and national levels together for a fee of approximately \$9.00.

The 1973-74 regional representative from ISUE, which is in Indiana's region 3, was Steve Waller. As regional representative, he attended monthly state meetings and was in charge of contacting other schools to report on the state meetings. He also was active in working on regional planning meetings. The planning committee is instrumental in planning more program meetings than business meetings, with topics designed to help and interest a future teacher. Some of the topics discussed with teachers and principals of various schools over the past year were: sex education in schools, a bussing debate, integration, and the open classroom concept. Dr. Victor Fisher, Vanderburgh Co. Superintendent of Schools, was a speaker at one of the meetings. In first semester student another meeting, teachers spoke to those members who would be student teaching during the second semester. This interchange proved beneficial to those beginning teachers.

The SEA has one money-making project each year, the compiling, printing and sale of the campus calendar. Proceeds from this project go to the organization.

Karen feels that as an SEA member and former president, she has learned a great deal from these meetings. Programs and discussions with teachers, principals and other school officials she feels gives valuable insight into many aspects of teaching, which she hopes to make use of next year as a second grade teacher at St. Wendell Grade School. Also, the contact with these teachers and school officials is not only helpful now for communication, but undoubtedly will help her and other SEA members in their future careers of teaching.




**Jane Snow**, 1973, is completing work on the degree Master in Library Science at Indiana University. Jane was an English and History major at ISUE.






# Economist Advises Graduates

Finance columnist Sylvia Porter addressed the 1974 graduates of ISUE during the Commencement exercises. Excerpts from her comments follow:

The American marketplace into which you are about to enter now as an adult, is an economic jungle. As in all jungles, you easily can be destroyed if you are ignorant of the basic guides for survival. But you can also come through safely. You even can conquer the jungle if you learn the rules, if you heed them, and if you refine them for your own use.

My special challenge to you is that you now prepare yourself to win in every sphere of your economic life, too. This you cannot do, unless you take advantage of the help that is being increasingly offered to you. Each of you must decide how much and what responsibility you will accept on your own for the protection of yourselves and eventually your family. And this, I admit, is how it should be and how it must be. For neither you nor I would want to be so protected that our choices of goods or services, or whatever, in this jungle would become severely limited, and the marketplace would become a dull neuter sort of place...






You could save hundreds of dollars a year without necessarily sacrificing any quality whatsoever just by buying large packages in many areas rather than small packages, but there are also infuriating exceptions. A recent nationwide survey revealed that shoppers make the wrong choices a shocking 40% of the time on which can, or bottle or package, or whatever, is cheapest when the packages do not fully explain the comparisons and when they really don't look. These errors translate into an average cost of 10½ on every dollar that you spend in the grocery store...

Young men and young women, you will borrow money over the years to come, perhaps very big sums of it. Will you know the rules? Will you obey them? Will you know the traps? Will you try to avoid them? Will you try to get rid of them? Will you know the swindlers? Will you go after them? You will buy or rent a home. You will furnish and you will finance your home. Will you know the ways to protect yourself when you are making the biggest investment of your life? If you find that you are faced with a crook, will you try to get rid of the crook?

Will you try to warn others? Or will you fall into the traps, pick yourself up and get into the jungle of which I spoke and never come out again. You will invest and you will speculate in stocks and bonds, mutual funds and commodities, even in the far-out fields ranging from comic books to antique cars, from prints to art to autographs. Will you blindly waste the money for which you will presumably by than have worked so hard? Or will you do what you're doing because you know what you're doing? All your teachers have been able to do and all they could ever do is to give you the basic guidelines and then say, go on. It's up to you.

I am not using silly words nor am I being in any way anti-American to the country I love so much when I tell you this is a jungle, because it is. What I am talking about is nothing less than the very core of your life. I would like to see your generation not only conquer this, but also clean it up a lot more than my generation has been able to do. And the only reason I am here tonight, ladies and gentlemen, is that your Board of Trustees of this great university, has paid me the honor of recognizing that at least I have tried.





# BILL STRAEFFER ADMISSIONS DIRECTOR

When Bill Straeffer accepted the Admissions Director position at ISUE last March, it was mid-season for recruiting students. Just coming from the Admissions Office at Western Kentucky University, Bill had recruited locally for that University. On the job with ISUE, Bill came in contact with a student who had heard him speak as a recruiter for Western Kentucky University and now he was hearing Bill speak for Indiana State University Evansville. After the conference was over, the student, totally perplexed, came up to Bill and said, "Now I really don't know where to go-Western Kentucky or ISUE?

Western Kentucky won that recruit, but ISUE hasn't lost many since that time.

A handsome, conscientious gentlemen, Bill Straeffer talks about his Admissions job at ISUE with genuine enthusiasm. Personal contact with students, Bill feels, is so im-

portant. "Each student has a particular situation, unique to him or her. We want to help each student at this important time in life." Personal letters, followup phone calls, and individual interviews are not too much when Bill Straeffer is dealing with a prospective student.

In addition to recruitment, the Admissions Office is involved with processing student applications, coordinating advisement for the students, and testing.

Last year 997 applications were received by the Admissions Office. Students enrolling at ISUE are geographically located in Region 13 -- the 11 county area in Southwestern Indiana. Ninety-two percent of the students come from that area, and seventy percent are from Vanderburgh County.


Admissions is a numbers game, many critics claim. "With enrollments dropping in colleges across the United States, numbers are important," Bill explains. "But I feel the quality of the student body is also significant. A good student is much more likely to stay in college for the four-year program, allowing retention rates to remain stable. A poor student often lacks the fortitude to continue the college career."

Notorious for telling jokes to begin a session with prospective students, Bill has an easy manner with the students. He meets with area high school counselors throughout the year and attends "College Nights" where he has the opportunity to meet prospective students and parents.

A most asked question by parents and students alike concerns cost of a college education. "Students are first anxious to see if we have the academic program they want, and secondly what the financial situation will be. Fortunately our fees have not increased in the last three years, and we can offer an economical, quality education program. Scholarships and grants and other financial

assistance programs are also offered through the Financial Aids Office."

The Office of Admissions shoulders much responsibility in student recruitment, for often the student's first contact with the University is through this office. But Bill claims students



can do the most effective job in recruiting for ISUE. "Students listen to other students, and go where their friends are satisfied. A current student's attitude plays a definite role in a prospective student's final decision to come to our University. And that's true for any college or university. It takes a total university commitment from students, alumni, faculty, and administrators in order to attract students."

BE PREPARED is the scout's motto and this summer session student's motto. With pen and pencil handy, he is ready to take any amount of notes. First summer session ended July 16. A second five-week session began July 17.

# NEW STRATEGIES for a WORLD AUTO MARKET

Currency devaluations, inflation, soaring labor costs and growing consumer affluence in Europe, Japan and the Middle East are affecting world auto makers more than the energy problem. These factors, along with study of the expanding multinational operations of the automobile manufacturers, were among the topics considered in ISUE's Seminar in International Marketing, introduced during the 1974 Intersession.

The change in economic conditions here and abroad is forcing GM, Toyota, Volkswagen, Fiat and other auto producers to consider moving into the world's just-emerging auto markets in South America, Asia, Eastern Europe and Africa.

While the primary impetus for this effort is the corporate desire for a larger share of the world market, there is an additional point. All the contestants are attempting to apply the principles that they have learned at home: tight cost control, product innovation, automation, sharper marketing skills and price strategies. Since over half of the world is underdeveloped in terms of the auto market, the contest is vast, financially attractive and increasingly competitive. Only the energy problem could dampen this expansion. The North American Market is rapidly reaching saturation, with one car for every two people. Consequently, the future is in the less developed areas with resources, excess labor and potential markets.

A parallel development is greater integration of overseas auto operations. "The arrow of the future points to more common

products for more geographical areas," says Chrysler's Chairman, Lynn Townsend. In Townsend's argument for the evolution of similar market stratification on a global scale we can see the possible future development of a "world car." This car would be built and sold everywhere, multi-sourced and produced in all major markets. While this seems unlikely in the near future, there will probably be commonization of parts among international car makers to the point where engines,

transmissions and even some sheet metal will be similar, while grilles, optional equipment, and interior appointment will be tailored to different tastes in various parts of the world.

This international marketing pattern should carry over into other consumer and industrial

product areas, enabling continued agressive world economic expansion. Such an activity could forestall the political and economic collapse which observers of the resource and energy shortage situation expect to occur during the coming years. International marketers will be playing an important and dynamic part in this process.



#### **NEW APPROACH TO ENGLISH CURRICULUM**

The English Department has gained approval for some major innovations in its composition curriculum. Beginning next year. students who complete their first semester of Freshman English will no longer be required to take a single course (the old English 102) to fulfill the second half of their General Education Requirement. Instead they will be able to choose one of three options: a course in Exposition and Argumentation, a course in Advanced Compositon, or a course in Creative Writing. Students will be encouraged to take these courses after their freshman year so they will not have to discontinue their study of language once they become sophomores.

Barbara Marting, Professor of Business, was presented the first annual Education Award by the Babcock and Wilcox Management Club of Mt. Vernon. The Education and Training Committee of the B & W Management Club plans to annually honor an individual, group

or institution that has made a significant contribution to higher education in the business community.

Frank Stanonis, Chairman of the Division of Science and Mathematics, was chosen as an Outstanding Educator of America for 1974. Outstanding Educators of America is an annual awards program honoring distinguished men and women for their exceptional service, achievements, and leadership in the field of education.
