NATIONALLY-KNOWN EDUCATOR TO SPEAK, Dr. Shirley H. Engle, Professor of Education and until recently, Associate Dean for Research and Advanced Studies at Indiana University Bloomington, will be the featured speaker at the Indiana State Teachers Association (ISTA) and the Association of Teacher Educators (ATE) joint session which will be held at Central High School on October 29, in conjunction with ISTA Instructional Days.

Dr. Engle, a nationally-known celebrity, is a past President of the National Council for the Social Studies, and is also a past President of the Indiana Council for Social Studies, receiving its Distinguished Service Award.

Dr. Engle has been a public school teacher, and has served as a curriculum consultant for Chulalongkorn University and the College of Education, Bangkok, Thailand, under the AID Program. He is a member of the United States National Commission for the UNESCO and on the Board of Advisors of the Council for the Study of Mankind. Dr. Engle's topic will be "Quality Control In Education: A Reaction" and is scheduled to begin at 10:00 a.m. in Room 1. All interested persons are welcome to attend.

ALDO CARDARELLI, Assistant Professor of Education, has been appointed to the College and University Committee of the Indiana Council for Social Studies. The Council, state affiliate of the National Council for Social Studies, provides services for the 36 colleges and universities in Indiana that prepare social studies teachers.

J. MAXWELL DAVIS, Professor of Life Science, and *JAMES SCHWENGEL*, Lecturer III in Life Science, were honored at a luncheon given by the National Association of Biology Teachers during the convention in Denver, Colorado October 14-17, 1976. The luncheon was for recipients of the Outstanding Biology Teacher Award given each year to Secondary Biology Teachers. Each state selects one biology teacher each year for this award. *MR. DAVIS* received the award in 1968 and *MR. SCHWENGEL* in 1973. Part of the award was a research microscope given by American Optical Company.

ROBERT E. MAYS, Director of Student Teaching and Laboratory Experiences, recently represented Indiana State University Evansville and the Division of Education at the Third Annual Academic Affairs Conference of Midwestern Universities, which was held October 14-15, 1976 at Indiana State University-Terre Haute. The theme of the conference was Future Directions in Field Experiences.

On October 20, 1976, *DANIEL C. SCAVONE*, Associate Professor of History, presented a slide lecture for the Evansville Archaeology Club entitled "The Legends, Archaeology, and History of Ancient Troy."

SEMINAR TO ANALYZE EVANSVILLE BUSINESS, Four business experts will be featured speakers in the seminar, Regional Business Opportunities: Looking Beyond Tomorrow, offered on three Thursdays in November. The seminar will analyze Evansville area business development potential and is being sponsored by Indiana State University Evansville and the Metropolitan Evansville and Mt. Vernon Chambers of Commerce. The seminar dates are November 4, 11 and 18.

The November 4 seminar will focus on "Trends, Developments, and Markets in the Contemporary Business Environment" and will feature George T. Haymaker, Jr., who is Treasurer of Alcoa in Pittsburgh. "Analyzing the Evansville Market and its Business Opportunities" will be the topic of the November 11 seminar. Speakers for this session will be Morton Marcus, Director of Business Research at Indiana University, and John Rowe, Project Manager of Indiana Census User Services Project. Addressing the final session, "New Product Analysis and Introduction," will be Frederick "Rick" Winter, Director of the Graduate Marketing Program at the University of Illinois.

All seminars will be held on the ISUE campus, with each seminar registration to begin at 4:30 p.m. and the principal address beginning at 5:00 p.m. Registration fee is \$30.00 per session or \$75.00 for all sessions. The fee includes dinner. Registration materials are available in the Office of Continuing Education.
