

Dr. Foroughi also has had his paper on "A Proposal for an Experimental Study of the Impact of Communication Medium and Level of Conflict on the Effectiveness of Negotiation Support Systems (NSS) in Dispersed Settings," accepted for presentation at the 25th annual meeting of the Decision Sciences Institute, to be held in November in Honolulu. The article is to be published in the conference Proceedings. Dr. Foroughi will chair a conference session on "Decision Support for Strategic Processes." He was a reviewer for a paper on "Neural Network Applications for Prediction of Bankruptcy," which has

been submitted for presentation at the conference.

Dr. John H. Gottcent, professor of English and coordinator of the General Education Program, has been appointed state faculty representative to the Indiana Commission for Higher Education by Governor Evan Bayh. The faculty post alternates among Hoosier colleges and universities, with Dr. Gottcent becoming the first USI faculty member to sit with the Commission.

Dr. Victoria Pohl, professor of math-

public health microbiology at the University of California Medical Center and was with the Division of Infectious Diseases at Wadsworth VA Medical Center, both in Los Angeles, through 1986. She was chief clinical microbiologist in the Pathology Department at Kettering Medical Center in Ohio in 1987 and accepted her current position in 1988. She has received a five-year CF-RDP Center grant and has been the principal investigator in a Phase I study of an experimental treatment of cystic fibrosis.

Mr. Imbler took over operation of the Evansville company in 1991 when First Atlantic Capital of New York City became the major stockholder through a leveraged buyout. He previously was president and CEO of Risdon Corporation in Naugatuck, Connecticut, one of the world's largest manufacturers of cosmetic packaging. Before joining Risdon,

Mr. Imbler was vice president and general manager of American Can Company's food and general line metal can business.

Mr. Imbler began his business career as a management consultant with Boston Consulting Group, specializing in corporate strategy, and also has held executive positions with Conrail and Gulf Oil. He has lived and worked throughout the U.S. and overseas. Mr. Imbler received an M.B.A. with high distinction in 1973 from the Amos Tuck School of Business at Dartmouth College, where he was an Edward Tuck Scholar. He also has two B.S. degrees, in geology and oceanography, from the University of Washington.


