TRUSTEES, DENNER AWARDS PRESENTED

The prestigious Trustees Distinguished Merit Award and the Melvin Denner Health Professions Award were presented March 23 to USI Presidential Scholars in the School of Science and Engineering Technology, during the second day of 1993 Honors Week ceremonies.

Ms. Sondra K. Wolf was selected for the \$1,000 Trustees Award. Each of the five schools nominate a top student for consideration. Ms. Wolf is a biology major who has completed her studies at USI in three years and has been accepted by the Indiana University School of Medicine. She is the Fred Newman Family Presidential Scholar.

Ms. Patricia A. Godeke received the \$1,000 Denner Award presented annually to a senior who has been accepted in a doctoral granting institution in health professions. A biology major, she will continue her studies in the IU School of Medicine. She is the Industrial Contractors Presidential Scholar.

Multiple awards were frequent during Honors Week. The \$2,300 David L. Rice Scholarship was presented for the third year to Ms. Kim B. Foltz, a junior chemistry major who plans to enter research. She also received a \$750 USI Alumni Association Scholarship; the \$400 O. John Logsdon Chemistry Scholarship, also an academic merit award; and a \$300 Mead Johnson Scholarship.

Ms. Stacey Alspaugh received six awards in the Dental Hygiene Program -- the USI Alumni Association/Deborah Henry and Phyllis Maddox Faculty Recognition Scholarship, \$750; Ohio Valley Dental Hygienists' Association Scholarship, \$200; Sigma Phi Alpha Dental Hygiene honorary Scholarship, \$100; Sigma Phi Alpha membership; Academic Achievement Award; highest Dental Hygiene grade point average (GPA).

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BIOCHEMISTRY EDUCATOR TO SPEAK

An Evansville native who is professor emeritus in biochemistry and cell biology at State University of New York, Stony Brook, will visit the USI campus April 6-7 as a speaker in the Community of Scholars/Biology at the Interface series.

Dr. Frank C. Erk, now acting master of the Stony Brook Honors College, will present a public lecture at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 7, in Forum I on "The Human Genome Project: Science and Ethics." The \$3-billion-plus project has stirred controversy in Congress and the biomedical community, stimulating debate on privacy issues in genetic screening and ethical use of information gained by knowing the complete map and genetic coding of the human genome -- the blueprint of genetic information that determines the development and functioning of human beings.

Dr. Erk also will discuss "Teaching Biology in the 21st Century" with area science teachers at 4 p.m. Wednesday in Forum I and participate in faculty/student discussions.

CREDIT SWAP APPROVED. USI and Ivy Tech in Evansville have become the first colleges in Indiana to sign a memorandum of understanding allowing general education course credits at Ivy Tech to be transferred without restrictions to a public university. The program is effective with the 1993 Fall Semester.

The agreement provides that an Ivy Tech student who wants to work toward a four-year degree could transfer 18 credit hours in computer literacy, English composition, psychology, sociology, and speech unconditionally. Credits in macroeconomics, microeconomics, and accounting at Ivy Tech also could be transferred if the student maintains a "C" or better grade or achieves
