MARLENE SANDERS TO APPEAR IN HUMANITIES FORUM. ABC television network news writer

and producer, Marlene Sanders, will be speaking in Evansville when she appears in the Humanities Forum on February 16 at 11:00 a.m. in Room A28. Marlene Sanders is the first woman to anchor a television network evening newscast. She is a full-time documentary producer for ABC News. Her most recent work was writer, producer, and director for "ABC News Closeup" on "Women's Health: A Question of Survival" that was broadcast on January 5. Other reports written and produced by Ms. Sanders for the award-winning "ABC News Closeup" series of documentary specials include "The Right to Die," which explored disturbing ethical and legal issues when there is no hope of recovery for the sick; "Prime Time TV: The Decision Makers," an examination of television programming; and "Lawyers: Guilty as Charged?" which looked at lawyers' ethics, competence and fees. In 1974, she was awarded the Ohio State Award, the Front Page Award, and the Writers Guild of America Award for "The Right to Die."

As a full-time producer in 1973, she wrote and produced the hour-long special, "Woman's Place," which examined the changing role of women in today's society and won a Golden Eagle Certificate from the Council on International Nontheatrical Events (CINE), and the Clarion Award. Also in 1973, Ms. Sanders wrote and produced the hour-long documentary, "Population: Boom or Doom," a study of U.S. population growth patterns. The widely acclaimed "Children in Peril," a half-hour documentary on the problem of child abuse, was written and produced by Ms. Sanders in 1972.

Marlene Sanders joined ABC News as a radio and television correspondent in 1964. Prior to that time, she worked for radio station WNEW in New York. Ms. Sanders was born in Cleveland and attended Ohio State University.

WORLD RENOWNED ARCHITECT TO LECTURE ON CAMPUS. Buckminster Fuller, world renowned architect and educator, will be on campus to deliver a public lecture on February 25, 1976. Dr. Fuller, perhaps best known as the inventor of the geodesic dome, will speak on "Utopia or Oblivion." At age eighty, Buckminster Fuller is one of the nation's most sought-after lecturers and authors. Currently, he is World Fellow in Residence at the University of Pennsylvania, Haverford College, Swarthmore College, Bryn Mawr College, and the University City Science Center in Philadelphia. He is also Distinguished University Professor at Southern Illinois University. He holds thirty-eight honorary doctorates and twenty-seven awards, including five from the American Institute of Architects and one from the Royal Institute of British Architects.

Dr. Fuller's lecture on the ISUE campus will be part of the University's contribution to the local Bicentennial commemoration. He is participating in the Bicentennial course, American Issues, which brings local and national experts to the campus to discuss the nation's progress during its 200 years and its role in its third century. The lecture will begin at 7:30 p.m. in A126. All interested persons are invited to attend.
