PHILHARMONIC SEASON OPENS SATURDAY. The Evansville Philharmonic Orchestra will open its season Saturday, September 18, 1976 at Vanderburgh Auditorium with a program of "Mostly Mozart" featuring Sherry Sylar, oboe; Laurence Shapiro, violin; and Joel Lipton, viola. Selected themes will include Haydn: Concerto for Oboe and Strings in C; and Mozart: Sinfonia Concertante for violin and viola, and Symphony No. 41 in C, "Jupiter". Maestro Minas Christian will conduct the symphony.

Mr. Christian has built the Evansville Philharmonic into a superb orchestra since coming to the city in 1953. Under his direction, the Philharmonic has grown progressively to become a metropolitan orchestra with superb quality and high professional standards. The Orchestra now presents eight Subscription Concerts, two Pop Concerts, six Youth Concerts, the Tri-State Youth Concert, 12 Little Symphony performances and 55 performances of the Evansville String Quartet and the Philharmonic Woodwind Quintet.

Subscription series tickets are still available for the 1976-77 season. A wide variety of music and guest artists will be participating. Programs include Gary Graffman, famed concert pianist; the Cincinnati Ballet Co.; Pierre Fournier, cellist; Silvia Marcovici, Romanian violinist; the Harvard Trio; and others.



SCHOLAR AWARDS ABROAD STILL OPEN. The Office of International Studies has information regarding Senior Fulbright-Hays Scholar Awards Abroad that are still open for 1977-78 application. There are several in English and History as well as other fields. Grants for advanced research in Indiana 1977-78 may also be applied for prior to November 15. Details are available in the Office of International Studies, Room 415-Conference Center, Extension 5337 on the Terre Haute campus.

1977-78 Teacher Exchange Program. The Division of International Education of the U.S. Office of Education has announced the 1977-78 Teacher Exchange Program for elementary and secondary school teachers, college instructors, and assistant professors.

Opportunities will be available to teach overseas during academic year 1977-78 or to attend a seminar abroad during the summer of 1977. Teaching positions will involve interchanges with teachers from Canada, Germany, New Zealand, and the United Kingdom. One-way assignments will be available in Denmark and Greece.

Summer seminars will be held for teachers of 1) art and art history in Belgium and the Netherlands; 2) German and German studies in Germany and 3) classics in Italy. Subject to the availability of funds, seminars may be held over for 1) teachers of world/Middle Eastern history in Egypt; 2) teachers of world/Asian history in India and Pakistan, and 3) social studies supervisors and curriculum directors in India.

Workshops were conducted by **ROBERT M. SMALL**, Associate Professor of Education (Development of The Pre-School Child), **ALDO CARDARELLI**, Associate Professor of Education and Director of the Metro-Core Program (Designing a Competency-Based Head Start Program), **JANET GREER**, Instructor in Education (Learning Centers and the Pre-School Child) and **ROBERT E. MAYS**, Associate Professor of Education and Director of Student Teaching and Laboratory Experiences (Personalizing The Head Start Curriculum).

The Workshop series and orientation program were designed by **ROBERT E. MAYS**, who is serving as Consultant to Project Head Start.

PEOPLE IN THE NEWS. **ROBERT E. MAYS**, Associate Professor of Education and Director of Student Teaching and Laboratory Experiences, was one of a select number of Indiana educators to attend a meeting held in Indianapolis, Indiana in August. The University of Evansville played host to the matches held at the Carson Center courts.

Prior to the match **COACH SCHWENK** expressed eagerness at the seasons beginning: "I'm looking forward to the upcoming opening matches. "I'm anxious to gain some insight into this program and to be able to evaluate some of the skill levels of the present players against intercollegiate competition."

Indiana State University Evansville has announced a 12 game abbreviated fall baseball schedule which began with a game pitting the Eagles against Vincennes University at ISUE on Saturday, September 11 with the Eagles losing the first game 8-7 and winning in the second game 3-1. *LARRY SHOWN'S* 32 man squad met Kentucky Wesleyan on Sunday to win in a double-header 3-0 and 11-5.

Included on the fall schedule are home and away doubleheaders with Vincennes University, Kentucky Wesleyan and Ohio Valley Conference representative Western Kentucky. *COACH SHOWN* must ready his pitching staff for the mid-September barrage of games. "We have a lot of new people this year and I'm expecting a degree of improvement in our record," comments the ISUE manager.
