DIVISION CHAIRMAN, SCIENCE AND MATHEMATICS.

Dr. Melvin Denner, Associate Professor of Life Science, has been appointed to serve as Acting Chairman of the Division of Science and Mathematics during the period of leave of absence of Professor Frank Stanonis. Governor Julian Carroll has asked Dr. Stanonis to accept the assignment of Commissioner of Environmental Quality for the state of Kentucky.

PRINT SHOW IN CONFERENCE CENTER. Prints and drawings by John Begley, Gallery Director, Gallery of Contemporary Art, New Harmony, are being shown in the Conference Center, UC 350, 351, 352 and 353 until Friday, January 30. The print show is open to the public, free of charge.

HUMANITIES FORUM. Ann Scott, Assistant Professor of English, will speak on the subject, "The Tarot." The origins of the Tarot are obscure, but Dr. Scott will consider it from its most likely beginning as a symbolic representation for non-literate initiates into the "secret" spiritual knowledge required for initiation into the priesthood. The presentation will include a screen projection of Waite deck and a display of various decks. She will be speaking on January 22 at 1:00 p.m. in Room A28.

Associate Professor of Philosophy, Richard Mussard, will speak on "The Ethics of Belief: A Plea for the Recognition of Our Duty to Think Soundly and to Believe Only Rationally Certified Belief." His topic will be discussed on January 30 at 12:00 noon in the Library Faculty Reading Room.
