Based on a popular Broadway play, which in turn was based on Henry James' novel, Washington Square, this film gave Ms. de Havilland her second Academy Award. In nearly every way, this film can be used to illustrate the conventions of the "well made" Hollywood movie.

AIDS AWARENESS DAYS

Thursday-Friday, -- The two-day program is designed to provide information for USI students and staff and the public about AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome), a fatal illness for which medical science has yet to find a cure. Prevention has been defined as the only available strategy, making it critical that everyone understand how the illness is transmitted, how it can be treated, how to react to persons who get AIDS, and other important questions surrounding the tragic illness. October has been declared "AIDS Education and Prevention Month" by the Center for Disease Control's National AIDS Education and Information Program and it is anticipated that Mayor Frank McDonald II will issue a proclamation declaring October 1-2 as "AIDS Awareness Days" in Evansville. The program will include a panel discussion, workshops on specific AIDS issues, and displays by various groups involved with the diagnosis and treatment of the illness.
