STUDENT WORKER RATE INCREASE STARTS JULY 1. Effective July 1, 1979 all regular student workers and all work-study student workers will receive an hourly wage increase of \$.20 per hour. The increase will change the hourly rate from \$2.50 per hour to \$2.70 per hour.

All hours worked will be compensated at the rate of \$2.70 per hour. Scheduled hours for work-study students are not to exceed 20 hours per week if these students are enrolled in classes during the Fall, Spring and Summer semesters. Work-study student workers may be scheduled up to 37½ hours per week during University vacation periods and during the summer if the students are not enrolled in summer classes. Regular student workers are not to average more than 20 hours per week while classes are in session during the Fall and Spring semesters. Scheduled hours are not to exceed 37½ hours per week during University vacation periods and during the summer months for regular student workers.

COMING ATTRACTION. The Offices of Campus Ministry and Continuing Education are organizing a weekend workshop for the Fall entitled My Mother, Myself designed to explore how a woman's relationship with her mother helps form her personality.

The workshop will deal with each participant's mother-daughter relationship, focusing on how a mother's feeling about herself sexually influences her daughter's sexuality.

During the 15 hour program, specific exercises will be used to augment the participant's awareness of her relationship with her mother and how that relationship influences her attitudes and behavior today.
