USI has had 20 student athletes named Academic All-Great Lakes Valley Conference for fall semester sports, three of them winning repeat honors.

To be eligible, the student athlete must be a starter or a top reserve, participate in a fall sport sponsored by the GLVC (men's and women's cross country, men's and women's golf, men's and women's soccer, women's tennis, and volleyball), and have a 3.0 grade point average or a 3.2 GPA in each of the previous two semesters.
