STUDENT FEEDBACK REQUESTED. Area high school guidance counselors, principals, and junior college personnel will meet with ISUE students who were former students at their individual schools on April 7, 1976 in the University Conference Center. "The purpose of the session," according to *Bill Straeffer*, ISUE Director of Admission, "is for secondary and junior college administrators to get feedback from their former students concerning the academic preparation received prior to enrollment at ISUE." *Bill* adds,

"To be aware of their former student's feelings about this institution helps the counselor advise other students interested in ISUE."

Approximately 1500 ISUE students have been invited to participate in the session between 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon. "Student participants who have continuous classes from 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 noon on April 7 will be excused from one of their classes for this program," explains *Dr. Reid*. *Dr. Reid* requests all faculty members who teach classes on April 7 from 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 noon to read an announcement in their classes officially excusing student participants from class. "This is being done to encourage participation in this program, not to give 1,500 students a day off. In fact, the students will be held accountable for missed work," *Dr. Reid* explained.

OFFICE STAFF TRAINING SERIES TO BEGIN APRIL 19. The Personnel Department is planning a series of one-hour training sessions beginning in April. The purpose of these meetings is to acquaint secretarial and clerical personnel with procedures necessary to expeditiously utilize services of ISUE divisions and offices.

Department heads are asked to excuse office personnel for the occasional brief periods necessary to accomplish the objective of improved efficiency. Whenever possible, attendance of clerical-support personnel should be planned so that no office is unstaffed, and inconvenience is minimized. To this end, each session will be conducted twice within a few days.

The first session will concern the Duplicating Office. Publications Director, Sherrienne Standley, will conduct a session from 2:00 - 3:00 p.m. on April 19 in Room 215 of the Technology Center. The session will be repeated at the same time and place on April 21. It is suggested that the person in each department primarily responsible for duplicating orders be scheduled to attend the first session. Others should be asked to attend the second.

A May session concerning University purchasing policies and procedures is also being planned, along with a later session on departmental financial record keeping. Details on these and other training series activities will be published soon.

CAMPUS TOUR. Students from the 7th and 8th grade of Dexter Elementary School will be on campus for a tour of the facilities on Friday, April 2 from 1:00 p.m.-2:00 p.m. ISUE students of Elementary Education will be guiding the tours, and when they are in your area, please welcome them. Approximately 75 students will be taking the tour.

AMERICAN ISSUES FORUM. The featured speaker for the March 31 American Issues Forum is *Darrel Bigham*, Associate Professor of History. *Dr. Bigham* will present "United States and the United Nations" at 7:30 p.m. in A34. A speaker is presented each Wednesday evening, and the public is invited to attend.

HUMANITIES FORUM. The April 1 Humanities Forum will feature *Michael Waitman*, Instructor in English, speaking on "Fools: April and Otherwise," at 11:00 a.m. in the Rare Books Room. This lecture will deal with prominent fools, mostly in literature, such as Shakespeare's Falstaff, Singer's Gimpel the Fool, and Bellow's Herzog, and will suggest that some folly is wisdom in disguise.

FACULTY COMMENCEMENT RESERVATIONS. The 1976 Commencement exercises will be held on Saturday, May 8, 1976 at 10:00 a.m. in the Vanderburgh County Civic Auditorium in downtown Evansville. *Richard Landini*, President of Indiana State University, will give the Commencement address.

Faculty and administrative personnel participate in the ceremony in academic regalia. According to the ISUE Handbook, "All faculty members are expected to participate in the Commencement exercises, and shall wear the appropriate academic costume."

Faculty and administrative staff are asked to complete the reservation form attached to University Notes and return the form to the Office of the President before Wednesday, April 14, 1976. Detailed instructions about assembling for Commencement will be issued at a later date.

RINGING OF BELLS TO HERALD THIRD CENTURY. A simultaneous, nationwide ringing of bells on July 4, 1976 will herald the country's entrance into its third century. Throughout the nation, churches, schools, fire departments, universities, and individuals will toll bells and carillons in conjunction with the ringing of the Liberty Bell in Philadelphia at 2:00 p.m. (E.D.T.). The time selected is exactly 200 years from the precise moment that the Liberty Bell proclaimed the independence of the new nation.

The Evansville Bicentennial Council encourages everyone's participation in this national effort, which was announced last week by John W. Warner, Administrator of the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration. This symbolic national effort, he explained, will "declare our freedom and signify our unity."

The bell-ringing should commence in Evansville at 1:00 p.m. (C.D.T.) and continue for two minutes. Radio and television stations are being asked to broadcast the sound of the bells during the period. The nationwide effort is encouraged and supported by a Senate Concurrent Resolution of the United States Congress.

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION 1976 TELEFUND. The ISUE Alumni Association will be conducting its third annual telephone fund-raising campaign on April 5, 6, 7, 12, 13, and 14 from 6:30-9:30 p.m. *William Burgdorf*, 1971 graduate, is General Chairman for the Telefund. Volunteers will be phoning from the Alumni Office at ISUE to the Evansville, Newburgh and Mt. Vernon areas, and also on SUVON. The volunteers plan to reach over 2000 alumni.

TRI-STATE COMPOSITION CONFERENCE. The Tri-State Composition Conference for high school and college English teachers throughout the Tri-State area will be held on Monday, April 5 at 3:00 p.m. in the Cafeteria, University Center. Discussants and panel members will talk or give papers on the following topics: "Why Write At All? A Bicentennial Question"; "Prewriting Strategies or Invention and Disposition: A Rhetorical Dilemma"; and "Bidialecticism or Not?". The Conference will be divided into two sessions, with social hour and dinner scheduled between sessions.

The meeting is an attempt to test the need for regional gatherings of English teachers and students with basic concerns for the study and teaching of English, especially at the general studies level. SPRING NONCREDIT SERIES. The Spring '76 series of noncredit community service courses will include All About Antiques, Beginning Printmaking, and Home Methods of Food Preservation, among others. Students enrolled in All About Antiques will study American and English antique furniture, china, glass, and accessories; American folk art; and modern collectibles. Defining, identifying, investing, finding, trends in collecting and purchasing antiques will be included in the course. Tips will even be given on how to buy at an auction! All About Antiques will benefit both the beginner and moderately experienced collector. Instructors for the course are Mr. Don Sohn, Curran Miller Auction and Realty Co., and Mr. Tom Marchand, Marchand's Antiques. The class will meet for four Tuesdays, beginning April 6, at 6:30 p.m. in A28. Registration fee is \$20.00.

Jack Cascione, Assistant Professor of Art, is conducting a course on Beginning Printmaking. Etching and intaglio processes in the classic tradition of such European artists as Rembrandt, Caravaggio, and Goya will be studied. Students will print original etchings from zinc plates on rag papers, and on completion of the course, will be able to make as many multiples of images they create as desired. The course will be offered for six Tuesdays, beginning April 6, at 6:30 p.m. in Art Center II. Registration fee is \$25.00.

Gain hands-on experience in this laboratory approach to Home Methods of Food Preservation. Students will actually prepare foods, as well as learn the scientific methods of preserving foods. Canning, freezing, pickling, and jelly and jam making will be covered. Mrs. Jeannine Harryman, Professional Home Economist, is conducting the course for six Wednesdays, beginning April 7, at 7:00 p.m. at Mater Dei High School. Registration fee is \$25.00.

The Spring '76 series of noncredit courses is open to anyone, regardless of educational background. The courses are presented in a noncompetitive, informal atmosphere where interest in learning is the primary consideration. PETROLEUM SPECIALIST TO SPEAK ON CAMPUS. Ruth Sheldon Knowles, internationally known petroleum specialist, writer, foreign correspondent, and lecturer will address *John Barnes' Introduction to the Earth and Sky Sciences* class on "The Current Oil Shortage and It's Economic Affects" on Wednesday, April 7, at 8:00 a.m. in Room A126. All interested persons are invited to attend.

Mrs. Knowles has served as a petroleum consultant to the United States, Mexican, Venezuelan, and Indonesian governments. Through personal investigations and detailed studies of the oil situation throughout the world, she has made significant contributions, not only to oil, but also to the understanding of the world food and population problems, and in solving environmental problems both in the United States and other countries.

Mrs. Knowles has made nine trips around the world in the last ten years, and has made in-depth editorial research trips to South America, the Middle East, and Indonesia. A war correspondent four times in South Vietnam from 1965 to 1970, she was made an honorary member of the U.S. Special Forces' famed Green Berets. She has interviewed outstanding world personalities such as King Gaisal of Saudi Arabia, President Suharto of Indonesia, President Thieu of South Vietnam, Prime Minister Golda Meir of Israel, and Prime Minister Fidel Castro and Che Guevarra of Cuba.

In 1962, just before the missile crisis, Mrs. Knowles spent a month in Castro's Cuba reporting her experiences in Petroleum Today and U.S. News and World Report. She has contributed to Reader's Digest, Wall Street Journal, Los Angeles Times Syndicate, Fortune, Nation's Business, Atlantic and a number of other professional journals. She is also author of the bestselling book, The Greatest Gamblers: The Epic of American Oil Exploration, and Indonesia Today: The Nation That Helps Itself.

A series of radio programs were written by Mrs. Knowles for "Voice of America" broadcasts in Europe and the Middle East. She recently wrote a series of radio programs concerning the history and development of Middle East oil, which have been broadcast in Arabic in Middle East oil countries.

During the past year, Mrs. Knowles has been lecturing, speaking at conventions, and appearing on network and local television and radio programs throughout the United States, in connection with her new book, America's Oil Famine. She also spent a month in Indonesia where she produced, wrote and narrated a documentary film on the projects and nation-building activities of Pertamina, the Indonesian national oil company.

Mrs. Knowles resides in New York City and is the mother of four children.

BICENTENNIAL CONVOCATION. The Division of Social Science will present an interdisciplinary convocation in commemoration of the Bicentennial observance in three sessions. The first session will be moderated by *Quentin Davis*, Assistant Professor of Political Science, on Thursday, April 8, at 9:30 a.m. in Room SC294. "The Changing Status of Women" will be presented by *Charles Petranek*, Assistant Professor of Sociology, on Wednesday, April 14, at 2:00 p.m. in Room A28. The third session will be moderated by *Eric vonFuhrmann*, Assistant Professor of English, on Friday, April 23 at 2:00 p.m. in the Rare Books Room. "Minority Participation in the Bicentennial: Full, Little, or Not at All" will be the subject of discussion. All interested faculty members and students are invited to attend. Following the exchange of ideas and opinions by the panel members, the audience will be invited to participate. *Daniel Miller*, Chairman, Division of Social Science, is the coordinator of the Bicentennial Convocation.
