





Distinguished lecturer

The University of Southern Indiana's first annual Distinguished Lecture in Natural Science will be presented Thursday, October 17, by **Dr. David B. Wilson**, an Evansville native and Bosse High School graduate who is nationally recognized as an expert on the creation vs evolution controversy. Dr. Wilson is professor of history, mechanical engineering, and philosophy at Iowa State University.

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7 USI faculty members in regional innovation showcase

Seven USI faculty members will participate Thursday, October 17, in a "Showcase for Innovation" at the Southern Illinois University-Carbondale Student Union, with faculty and staff from institutions in a four-state area brought together to share information on sponsored research and service projects.

Distinguished Professor Lecture:

Dr. Charles F. Petranek, professor of sociology, will deliver his Distinguished Professor lecture during his 10 a.m. class Wednesday, October 23, and in a community forum at 7 p.m. Thursday, October 24, both in Forum I. Dr. Petranek was selected Distinguished Professor by his University colleagues in 1995, but was unable to deliver the lecture last academic year because he and his wife were on a world trip.

His lecture topic will be "Lessons from around the world." The University community and public are invited to attend either lecture.

Dr. Petranek receives achievement award

Dr. Charles F. Petranek, chair of the Sociology/Anthropology Department, was honored last week with the first Ifill and Reynolds Lifetime Achievement Award, presented at the 35th annual meeting of the North American Simulation and Gaming Association in Ottawa, Canada. The award recognized the multiple use and creation of social simulations for the classroom, training sessions, and workshops throughout one's career.

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Citizens Bank sponsoring Eagle Math Mania

Citizens Bank, in cooperation with the USI Athletic and Math departments and the Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation (E-VSC), will sponsor Eagle Math Mania this fall for local second- and third-grade students. Eagle Math is an incentive program to encourage young students to practice and improve their math skills.

USI student athletes and their coaches, led by USI basketball Coaches Bruce Pearl and Chancellor Dugan, introduced the program to over 900 students from Caze, Dexter, Fairlawn, Hebron, and Stockwell schools October 7 at PAC Arena, the first of three pep rallies for Eagle Math. The second rally October 22 will bring over 1,000 students from Culver, Delaware, Howard Roosa, Lodge, Scott, and Vogel schools. The final rally November 12 will involve 1,214 students from Cedar Hall, Cynthia Heights, Daniel Wertz, Highland, Lincoln, Tekoppel, and West Terrace schools.

Eagle Math Mania booklets were designed by elementary teachers and USI undergraduate elementary education majors and are compatible with questions from the ISTEP examinations. Sections are labeled first quarter, second quarter, third quarter, and fourth quarter, to carry out a sports theme. An overtime period contains accelerated questions to challenge self-motivated students. At the end of each quarter, students will be rewarded with incentives to show they have completed the section. The math problems revolve around athletic themes also. A sample problem is: "The Eagles score was 77 points. If they won the game against the Norsemen by 6 points,

His topic, "Did the Devil Make Darwin Do It? Rethinking the History of Science and Religion," is based on his early 1980s work leading to a paper, "Did the Devil Make Darwin Do It? Historical Perspectives on the Creation-Evolution Controversy," which was published in the Proceedings of the Iowa Academy of Science in 1982. Iowa State University Press then published his book, *Did the Devil Make Darwin Do It? Modern Perspectives on the Creation-Evolution Controversy*, which was selected by CHOICE in 1984 as the Outstanding Academic Book of 1983. The book went to a fourth printing this year.

The free public lecture will be held at 7 p.m. in Mitchell Auditorium; a reception will follow. Dr. Wilson's book, which was written for general audiences, will be available for sale and autographing. The Distinguished Lecture in Natural Science program, made possible by the generous support of Dr. Frank L. Stanonis, professor emeritus of geology and geography, and Mrs. Marilyn Stanonis, is expected to feature renowned speakers annually to heighten awareness and foster appreciation of the sciences at the University and in the Evansville community and greater Tri-State.

Ms. Holly Miller, travel editor for *The Saturday Evening Post*, instructor of magazine writing at Anderson University, contributor to numerous periodicals, and co-author with Mr. Hensley of *Write on Target: A Five-Phase Program for Nonfiction Writers*.

The Drinking Game, Medical Center, Downsizing, Nursing Home Admittance, and Alzheimer's Disease. In collaboration with others, he has recreated the simulations of Ghetto and Intimacy on the Beach. He has given workshops in the U.S. and throughout the world on the use of this experiential learning technique. Over his 23 years at USI, he has taught more students with social simulations than anyone else, has written several articles, and has developed extensive oral and written debriefing techniques.

His unique course, Simulated Games of Society, was a social psychology class taught with only six lectures, 12 social simulations, and extensive journal writing. His premise has been that participants learn by walking in the shoes of another. For example, in Ghetto, men have female roles and experience the nervousness of possibly getting pregnant in each of the ten rounds. If they do get pregnant, they lose resources and options. "Social simulations have been an exciting way to instill abstract principles," Dr. Petranek said, adding that after 20 years, "students still recall the early lessons learned."
