



HAPPY ST. PATRICK'S DAY! Today, March 17, is a day set aside to honor the patron saint of Ireland, St. Patrick. When and where the March 17 holiday was started is not known. Today it is celebrated wherever there are Irishmen or descendants of Irishmen.

The date and place of birth of St. Patrick is vague in historical accounts, although it is known that he was not born in Ireland.

Information about his life has mostly been derived from his own works. At the age of sixteen, Patrick was captured by Gaels and taken by boat to Ireland, where he was sold as a slave. His six years of captivity were spent tending flocks. During this time he experienced a spiritual awakening, and began to have dreams and visions which he considered to be divinely inspired. One of these dreams contained a message to escape, telling him that a ship would be waiting for him. He made his escape and traveled two hundred miles to find his expected ship. Three days later he landed in either Britain or Brittany.

He returned to his home, but once again the course of his life was directed by a dream. He saw a man approaching him, bearing a letter from the people of Ireland which urged him to free them from slavery.

The years preceding Patrick's election to the episcopate are not well documented. However, around the year 432, Patrick was ordained bishop of Ireland, where he spent the rest of his life. Many thousands of Irishmen were converted through his labors. He founded churches and schools, at least one college, and generally organized the Church in Ireland.

One of the stories concerning St. Patrick, which is often judged authentic, is the tale of the shamrock and the Trinity. In trying to teach his converts about the Trinity, St. Patrick would hold up a shamrock, explaining that the three leaves represented the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, while the stem was the Godhead itself from which they proceeded. This is said to be the origin of the use of the shamrock which is customarily worn on St. Patrick's Day.

In America, the first celebration of St. Patrick's Day appears to have been in 1737 by the Charitable Irish Society of Boston. The society was founded that year "for the relief of the poor and indigent Irishmen reduced by sickness, shipwreck, old age, or other infirmities." Today, in the United States, the holiday is observed almost everywhere. Irish societies hold their annual affairs, employees of businesses sport shamrocks and green articles of clothing, and parades are staged in New York City, Philadelphia, Cleveland, Boston, Los Angeles, Savannah, Atlanta, and in dozens of other cities. St. Patrick's Day may have begun as an Irish celebration, but as the contemporary American slogan declares, "Everybody's a little bit Irish on St. Patrick's Day!"

HUMANITIES FORUM, The featured speaker for the March 17 Humanities Forum will be *Eliseo DaRosa*, Professor of Economics. *Dr. DaRosa* will present "Toward a New Economic Order: A Latin-American Viewpoint," at 1:00 p.m. in the Rare Books Room. During the Forum, *Dr. DaRosa* will discuss whether or not a Third World Ideology is a viable alternative for our declining business civilization, and whether or not Latin-American intellectuals on the Left are offering such an alternative.

AMERICAN ISSUES FORUM. Alan Costa, Assistant Professor of Economics, will present "The Economic Dimension" at the American Issues class this evening at 7:30 p.m. in Room A34. Mr. Costa plans to begin his presentation with a general discussion of the role of the United States and the world economy in the sense of imports and exports, and will continue with the benefits American multi-national corporations bring to countries in which they operate, and the tensions that generate.

The ISUE Secretaries Club will hold its monthly meeting on Thursday, March 18, in UC351 from 11:45 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Sergeant Clarence Shepherd of Police Community Relations will be the featured speaker, and will show a film and discuss "Self-Defense for Women." Hostesses for the meeting will be Carol Taylor and Pam Henry.

JAZZ PIANIST TO PERFORM AT CENTRAL ARENA. Roy Meriwether, jazz pianist, and his trio will appear in concert on Friday, March 19, at 8:00 p.m. in Central Arena. A multi-dimensional and self-taught group, Meriwether blends jazz, blues, gospel and rock with classical elements in a unique and innovative style that has drawn enthusiastic crowds to night clubs and concert halls across the United States.

Meriwether, now 32, began playing the piano at the age of three, and had composed two pieces before he was four. He turned professional with his own group at age 18, and has devoted himself to both composing and performing since that time. Roy Meriwether has been described by critics as having "the sound of a champion, with thunder in his left hand and lightning in his right," and as a performer "with a creativity that is nothing short of genius."

The second half of the concert will be composed of Meriwether's new suite, "Black Snow." Fast growing in popularity, "Black Snow" is a 21-piece original work commissioned by the National Endowment for the Arts, which develops the evolution of the black experience through a series of major incidents and turning points in the lives of black people in the U.S. from 1619 to the present. "Black Snow" has been endorsed by the Ohio American Revolution Bicentennial Advisory Commission.

The Roy Meriwether Concert will be open to the public. Tickets will be on sale at Gates 1 and 3 at Central Arena starting at 7:00 p.m. on March 19 at \$2.00 per person. ISUE students will be admitted free.

EXECUTIVE-IN-RESIDENCE PROGRAM. Robert E. Green, President and owner of Executive Inns of Evansville and Vincennes, has been named the Executive-in-Residence for ISUE's Executive-in-Residence program. An astute businessman, whose accomplishments have received national recognition, Robert Green will address ISUE business students on March 24, 1976. Mr. Green will meet with faculty and students individually and in groups throughout the all-day session. He will lead discussions about policy formulation, decision-making, long-range planning, and day-to-day problems.

The Executive-in-Residence program, initiated by the Division of Business in 1972, is designed to stimulate the students' thinking and broaden their education through discussion and interaction with top level executives in business and industry. It allows the students to mesh classroom theory and real world practicality. The executive presents information in his area of expertise and counsels students in developing an approach to solving business-related problems which they will encounter after graduation.

Green, a native of Freelandville, Indiana, is a graduate of Indiana State University. After graduation he taught science and coached in Indiana high schools for six years. In 1939, he started Green Construction Company and developed it into one of the nation's largest earth moving and major highway construction firms. Mr. Green's list of honors includes being named one of the Top Six Young Self-Made Businessmen in the United States by Life Magazine in 1953, and recipient of the American Academy of Achievement's Golden Plate Award in 1969. He holds honorary degrees from Vincennes and Indiana State Universities.

BLOOD PRESSURE CLINIC. Health Services will offer a free blood pressure clinic for all ISUE employees on March 26, 1976. The purpose of the clinic is to take a resting blood pressure reading and determine if it is within "normal" limits. By taking the blood pressure reading, a medical professional can determine if the person suffers from hypertension, a condition which frequently results in heart disease, and may eventually be fatal. The clinic is voluntary, however every employee is urged to take advantage of the opportunity. No permanent record will be kept of the readings, and all results will be kept strictly confidential. The clinic will be held March 26, 1976 from 7:30 a.m.-6:00 p.m. in the Forum. Employees with a last name beginning with A-L may come to the Forum any time between 7:30 a.m.-12:00 noon; employees with a last name beginning with M-Z may have their blood pressure taken from 1:00 p.m.-6:00 p.m. Any person unable to come in for the clinic on March 26 may make an appointment with *Pat Like*, Director of Health Services, Ext. 307.
