



HUMAN RELATIONS INSTITUTE. The Human Relations Institute of Indiana State University was created in 1973 by a Title IV grant under provision of the 1964 Civil Rights Act. Funded initially to serve only the Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation, the Institute has steadily enlarged its program and scope of services. The Human Relations Institute now provides service to the Evansville, East Chicago, Gary and Hammond School Corporations.

The Institute is directed by *Dr. Glenn Kinzie*. *Ms. Judy Hummel*, Co-Director, works primarily with Evansville participants, and *Mr. Herman Matthews*, Desegregation Specialist, works with participating teachers in the Calumet Region.

The activities and work scope of the 1975-76 Human Relations Institute provide participating school corporations with teachers trained in curriculum, methods, human relations, and conflict resolution. Each school city will have its own highly trained facilitator team, as well as a trained team within each high school feeder district and an experienced staff member to serve their evolving needs. The total number of educators participating directly in the Institute is 115.

Major emphases of the Human Relations Institute have been placed in three areas: racism, sexism, and bilingual programs, with regard to textbook analysis, curriculum revision, workshop implementation (building-level), and on-going human relations projects. To meet these identified needs the Institute will receive funds of \$215,904.00 during the 1975-76 fiscal year.

LILLY LIBRARY FUNDS RESEARCH. The Lilly Library of Indiana University Bloomington has announced a program of small research grants and summer research fellowships. Supported by a \$15,000 grant from the Lilly Endowment, these funds are to assist faculty members of colleges and universities in Indiana who wish to use the resources and facilities of the Lilly Library in their research. The small grants provide a maximum of \$300 per scholar; the summer fellowships for 1976 carry a stipend of \$1600 and a dislocation allowance of up to \$400. FIRST ADVANCED GEOGRAPHY CLASS IN AREA. A geographer, who has spent the summer studying the traditional Irish culture of western Ireland, and who taught two years at Teachers' College, Kabwe, Zambia, will teach a World Geography course at Indiana State University Evansville this fall. This is the first time an advanced geography class will be offered in the Evansville area. *Donald L. Hunter* of 1100 Erie, Evansville, will be teaching the class.

FIRST ADVANCED GEOGRAPHY CLASS IN AREA, CONTINUED. Mr. Hunter received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Hanover College, and a Master of Science degree from Indiana University. He also holds a Master's degree from Oregon College of Education. In working toward completion of his doctoral degree, Mr. Hunter spent the summer of 1974 at the University of Northern Colorado. He has worked first-hand with various world cultures.

STATE-WIDE IN-SERVICE PROGRAM SPONSORED BY IHETS. Indiana State University Evansville faculty and staff will have the opportunity to discover recent developments in educational technology at a state-wide in-service program sponsored by the Indiana Higher Education Telecommunication System on October 2 and October 17 at Vincennes University.

The program content for the two days is completely different. October 2 will be concerned with instructional materials currently telecast on national public television and those available from large consortia, libraries, and commercial producers. October 17 programming will stress materials produced in Indiana in large studios and in classroom settings for use throughout the State and for individual student study.

The seminar is being conducted on ten campuses throughout the State with portions of the program brought through the distribution and instantaneous talkback facilities of the Indiana Higher Education Telecommunication System. Additional program input will be produced at the ten regional sites. ISUE personnel will attend the seminar with other college staffs of Southwestern Indiana, at Vincennes University. According to Dr. Donald Bennett, Vice-President for Administration, "Faculty and administrative staff are encouraged to take advantage of this opportunity to discover recent developments in educational technology at the in-service program. I do hope faculty will attend, and indicate their interest to the division chairperson as to whether or not they will attend."

MEDICAL INSURANCE CLARIFICATION. The Personnel Office, which administers employee benefits, has been asked to clarify medical insurance coverage as it concerns dependent children of covered ISUE employees.

Blue Cross-Blue Shield -- Dependent children are covered until December 31 following their 23rd birthday. The term "dependent" means any unmarried children, stepchildren or legally adopted children of the member or spouse who are dependent upon the member for support.

Major Medical-Dental -- Dependent children are defined as unmarried children under age 19 and unmarried children 19 years of age and under age 23 provided they are full-time students.

TELECOURSES TO BE OFFERED FOR THE FIRST TIME THIS FALL. For the first time this fall, Indiana State University Evansville will offer credit for courses telecast over the Public Broadcasting System (PBS) and its local affiliate, WNIN, Channel 9. Two telecourses have been approved for three semester hours of credit each. They are "The Ascent of Man," offered by ISUE as General Studies 180X, The Ascent of Man, and "Classic Theatre," offered as English 222X, Classic Theatre: The Humanities in Drama. The courses are open to the general public as well as to regular students. Tuition will be \$20.00 per semester hour, the same as for regular credit courses.

Each course consists of 13 telecasts and three required class meetings. For credit, students must view the 13 telecasts, read the textbook and anthology of related essays, and concurrently follow a prescribed study guide. There will be mid-term and final examinations.

The Ascent of Man is an award-winning series by Jacob Bronowski concerned with the history of man as a phenomenon in which science emerges as a natural activity of each age. The course is a cooperative program of ISUE and University of Evansville. The instructor is Dr. Russell Lewis of U of E. The first class meeting is September 16, 7:00-9:00 p.m., Lower River Room, Evansville Museum. The telecasts begin September 23.

Classic Theatre consists of 13 plays from classic literature and performed by premiere theatre companies. Each full-length performance will be preceded by a televised preview providing background on the play's author, setting, and literary significance. The first class meeting is September 23, 7:00-9:00 p.m. in Room 350, ISUE University Conference Center. The telecasts begin September 25. The instructor is Dr. Thomas Wilhelmus, ISUE Assistant Professor of English.
