BIOETHICS SERIES. "Theological Reflections, Human Life in Our Day," will be the second topic explored in the ISUE sponsored lecture/discussion series, Bioethics: The Interface of Biology and Society, April 7.

Dr. Richard A. McCormick, S.J., the Rose Kennedy Professor of Christian Ethics, Kennedy Institute, Center for Bioethics, Georgetown University and research associate at Woodstock Theological Center, will be discussing the evening's topic via a broad-

cast originating at Ball State University. Following his comments a panel of local persons will react to the topic and lead discussion from the audience.

Members of the local panel will be *BERNARD LUTZ*, coordinator of campus ministry, ISUE; Dr. Robert Kress, Associate Professor, Philosophy and Religion, UE; and Rev. Ann Melanson, R.N. and Minister, First Presbyterian, Evansville.

The session is open to the public and will meet in A34 of the Administration Building at 7:00 p.m. Four subsequent community forums will be presented on Thursday evenings at ISUE. The programs are designed to make the public aware of the dimensions and potential of biological technological issues facing today's society. Admission is free. The program is sponsored by ISUE Campus Ministry and Continuing Education.

HUMANITIES FORUM. The ISUE Readers Theatre, directed by *HELEN SANDS*, Associate Professor of Communications, will present "From the Garden," an Easter program, at 12:30 p.m. April 7. The Thursday program will be held in Room A126 and is open to the public. Readings will be from Green Pastures, Jesus Christ Superstar, and scripture.

EASTER EGG HUNT SATURDAY. The ISUE Student Union Board is sponsoring an Easter Egg Hunt Saturday, April 9 beginning at 10:00 a.m. The hunt is for all children of ISUE students and University personnel. The Easter Egg hunt will be held on the front lawn of the University (in case of rain, it will be held in the forum.) Children from the ages of 1-10 years can participate and will be divided into three age groups to give all children an equal chance to capture Easter surprises. And also, there will be a special visit from the Easter bunny.

ENGINEERING TECHNOLOGY SEMINAR PLANNED. The speaker for Engineering Technology Seminar on Tuesday, April 12 will be James W. Stott, Senior Engineer at Mead Johnson & Company. Mr. Stott is a Professional Engineer and a graduate of Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology. The seminar will be held at 1:00 p.m. in Room A126.

NATIONAL MINING MEETING SCHEDULED. A national meeting focusing on the mining industry will be held in Evansville at the Executive Inn on April 18, 19, and 20. National figures involved in the mining industry and energy education will be speaking during the three day National Mining Training and Development Conference sponsored by three higher education institutions.

Among the speakers will be the president of Bituminous Coal Operators' Association of Washington, D.C., Joseph Brennan; Vice President of Operations, Underground Mines, Freeman United Coal Mining Company, R.O. Rouse; and Dr. William H. Rauckhorst, education program manager for the Energy Research and Development Administration.

The conference is co-sponsored by Indiana State University Evansville, Southern Illinois University at Carbondale and Wabash Valley College in cooperation with the Illinois Basin Coal Mining Manpower Council. The conference is designed to serve as a catalyst in bringing together representatives of governmental agencies, educational institutions, industry, and business.

SPANISH CLUB PLANS BANQUET. The annual banquet of "El Club Latinoamericano," the ISUE students' Spanish Club, will be held on Sunday, April 17 at 5:00 p.m. in the University Center Cafeteria. All university students, faculty, staff and their families are welcome, as well as friends from the community. The menu will feature Arroz Con Pollo (Chicken with Rice) as the main dish, with other typical Spanish and Latin American foods. As in past years, entertainment will be informal with various students and guests "doing their own thing." Admission will be \$2.00 for adults, \$1.50 for children.

PEOPLE IN THE NEWS. JOHN H. GOTTCENT, Associate Professor of English, (on leave) will present his paper, "Teaching Literature Experientially," at the Annual Convention of the Indiana Council of Teachers of English at Indianapolis on April 23. The paper describes a theory of literature, and a pedagogical approach based on it, designed to remind us of the value of the art as a reflection of human experience. DR. GOTTCENT has also been awarded a small grant for research in the Lilly Library at Indiana University. The money, made available through the Lilly Endowment, will enable him to spend time in Bloomington during April doing research on the Bible as literature.

SHEILA GRIFFIN, Counselor Campus Ministry, and BERNARD LUTZ, Chaplain Campus Ministry, were in Chicago March 21-24 for number seven in a series of continuing education programs for Campus Ministries. It was funded by Indiana Newman Foundation and the National Institute of Campus Ministries backed up by a grant from the Lilly Endowment. The theme was Fund Raising as Ministry.

BOB GEHRING, Assistant Professor of Psychology, has just completed a 2-1/2 year project under contract with Houghton Mifflin. On March 22, he received official acceptance for publication of two related books, a 400-page textbook called Basic Behavioral Statistics and a shorter companion book to serve as a study guide and workbook. Both are being prepared for publication in January, 1978.

ISUE ART SHOW, APRIL 10. Indiana University Sculpture Department Chairman Jerry Jackard will be judging the 1977 ISUE Student Art Show on April 8, 1977. The student show will open on April 10 from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. in the ISUE Conference Center.

Professor Jackard has been at Indiana University for two years. He established his reputation in sculpture at the Chicago Circle School in downtown Chicago where he worked for many years.

He will be giving a public lecture on April 7 at 10:00 a.m. in the ISUE Technology Building. The student show will be on exhibit through April 22, 1977 in the ISUE Conference Center.
