## ISUE STUDENTS IN MEXICO

*Becky Boling*, ISUE senior Spanish major, is one of several students who are taking credit courses this summer in San Luis Potosi, Mexico. Asked to send back a story on her travels and stay in Mexico, *Becky* sent greetings to ISUE and this account.

"San Luis Potosi, where we stay, is a town of 200,000 people. It is surrounded by mountains. There are three wide streets that converge, but the uptown district is a maze of narrow cobble streets with sidewalks hardly wide enough for two people. In the heart of the city are many large plazas, usually with fountains and benches. People meet in the plazas just to talk, especially on Sundays. The churches are beautiful, mostly in the baroque style or a mixture of baroque and neoclassical architecture.

As opposed to the grandeur of the palace and the large churches or cathedrals, open air carts line the streets selling fruit and sandwiches. Also, little boys sell 'chicle' gum and ice cream.

Open air carts and large stores line the path in the Mercado, a mall area. Merchants are selling trinkets--some of which are cheaper in the Woolworth store. On the Mercado there is a building you can enter to shop. It has the onyx chess set, the purses, the carved wood, the leather, the hand-made clothes--all the things you're supposed to bring home to the family. This is where you haggle. The article starts at \$100 but if you act just disinterested enough, it can go down. We do a lot of walking here because it's nice weather.

Red rocks, dwarf trees and gigantic cactus are everywhere. Cows walk along the sides of roads searching for grass. The houses are small, red brick with slowly slanting roofs, usually one room and seemingly peaceful. In the mountains, the people build on the slopes and use terrace farming. Clothes are placed on cactus plants to dry in the sun.

The 'madre' of our house is a good example of how kind everyone is. She has accepted us as her own children--worries over us like a mother hen and feeds us as though we were dying of hunger. This is probably what enchants me most--the warmth of the people. We're almost always recognized as Americans just by our appearance. There aren't too many redheaded, blonde or just plain pale Mexicans here. But when we speak to someone in a store in Spanish, they seem so happy. They really want to help you.

The people show affection more easily than in the United States. The family is a tight unit. Relatives take care of one another and girl friends walk down the streets arm in arm. Farewell kisses are traditional.

As far as my Spanish, let it suffice to say that I'm having trouble writing this in English!"
