"CLAY TODAY," USI PAINTERS TO BE AT GALLERY. The New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art will present "Clay Today," which explores ceramics in a sculptural context rather than its traditional use as a utilitarian medium, and the varied works of six USI student artists during August. The ceramics exhibition involves:

Ms. Melissa Wright Pokorny, a recent graduate of the University of Southern Illinois at Edwardsville who now is studying for her MFA with **Mr. Robert Arneson**, internationally known sculptor, at the University of California at Davis. Her work is figurative, the content dealing with the loneliness and separation of individuals.

Mr. Mark Richardson, Massachusetts native and graduate of Indiana University who has taught ceramics at Herron School of Art since 1980 and has been the recipient of many awards from the Indiana Arts Commission. His slip cast sculpture combines forms and color to create a streamlined, space-age sculpture.

Mr. Walter Zurko, Montana native who studied at the University of Wisconsin and received his MFA from SIU-E. He has taught at Wooster College in Ohio since 1981 and is affiliated with Martha Schneider Gallery in Chicago and Pro-Art in St. Louis. His sculptures conjure thoughts of primitive and effigy figures.

Ms. Anne Meszko, Michigan native who studied at the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor. She taught high school art several years in St. Louis and now is coordinator of the Chicago International New Art Forms Exposition and director of communications for Chicago Art Expo at Navy Pier. Her "Trophy Heads" reflect her respect for nature and disdain for the needless killing of animals for sport.

The USI 400 Club of Painters -- senior and graduate student artists who have reached the highest level of study at USI -- will be featured in a separate exhibition in the Greenroom Restaurant, adjacent to the gallery. They include **Mr. Dan Adams, Ms. Donna Eaton, Ms. Debbie Leth, Mr. Tom Martin, Mr. Dan Sanders, Ms. Penny Shelton, and Mr. Frank West.**

A public reception will be held from 1 to 4 p.m. Sunday, August 10, at the gallery, honoring artists from both exhibitions. The gallery, supported in part by the Indiana Arts Commission and National Endowment for the Arts, is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday and 1 to 5 p.m. Sunday; it is closed on Mondays.

The "Musical Ceramic Sculpture" of **Mr. Brian Ransom** of Claremont, California, remains on display at the gallery through Thursday, July 31.

USI BOOTH AT SCOTT-VANDEBURGH FAIR. There will be a USI booth at the Scott-Vanderburgh County Fair, which runs through Saturday, August 2. COMPUTER COST REDUCED. IBM has announced that prices on the PC computer have been reduced, effective July 11 through December 31, 1986. The price for Model 5150-166 with green monochrome display, 256K memory, one disk drive, display and printer adapter, keyboard, and DOS 3.1, is \$1,010. The same equipment with two disk drives -- Model 5150-176 -- is \$1,060.
