Athletics faculty award honors Davis-Brezette

The Department of Athletics honored 55 of its top student athletes at the annual Screaming Eagle Scholars Luncheon on April 2. The annual luncheon was established in 2002 to recognize student athletes with a grade point average of 3.5 or better.

As a department, the more than 250 USI student athletes have a cumulative GPA of 3.074. Eight of the varsity programs – men's basketball, men's tennis, women's basketball, women's cross country, women's golf, women's soccer, softball, and volleyball – have a 3.0 GPA or better as a team.

The student athletes were not the only people honored at the luncheon. **Dr. Jane Davis-Brezette**, acting dean of Bower-Suhrheinrich College of Education and Human Services and chair of the Physical Education Department, was presented with an inaugural faculty award that will bear her name in future years. The award recognized Davis-Brezette for outstanding contributions to Athletics in areas of teaching, advising, and mentoring.

Nominations for the annual award will be made by student athletes, coaches, and staff members, and voted upon by the department.

Author and transplant surgeon will discuss mortality

Dr. Pauline Chen will offer a free public program Tuesday, April 29, at USI. Chen is a transplant surgeon and author. Her particular concern is end-of-life, or palliative, care.

In her book *Final Exam: A Surgeon's Reflections on Mortality* (Knopf, 2007), Chen investigates why we are so bad at taking care of the dying. The answers she found are a powerful mix of factors: a professional culture that, despite being intimately familiar with death, shrinks from discussing it with patients; the systematic training of young doctors to compartmentalize and dehumanize the patient; and the patient's indefatigable hope for recovery.

She will discuss her book from noon to 1 p.m. Tuesday, April 29, in Rice Library Room 0017.

Chen attended Harvard University and the Feinberg School of Medicine at Northwestern University and completed her surgical training at Yale University, the National Cancer Institute (National Institutes of Health), and UCLA, where she was named Outstanding Physician of the Year in 1999.

Her first nationally published piece, "Dead Enough? The Paradox of Brain Death," appeared in the fall 2005 issue of *The Virginia Quarterly Review* and was a finalist for the 2006 National Magazine Award. She is a recipient of the Staige D. Blackford Prize for Nonfiction and Yale University's George Longstreth Humanness Award, and she was a finalist for the 2002 James Kirkwood Prize in Creative Writing.

She lives near Boston with her husband and children.

Chen's visit to USI is sponsored by the Vista Care Hospice Foundation in memory of Evelyn and Leonard Lottes. Students are encouraged to attend. She will be available to sign copies of her book after the program.

Recycled prizes part of the fun at USI's Earth Day Celebration

International Programs and Services and Residence Life are hosting an Earth Day Celebration for the USI community at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 23, in the Ruston Hall multipurpose room. The event will place a particular emphasis on the importance of recycling.

Everyone in attendance will receive a "Recycle USI" water bottle. Participants will pot herbs in recycled tin cans, play Earth Day Recycling Trivial Pursuit, and snack on trail mix and "dirt pudding."

There will be give-aways and prizes including recycled rice bag totes, recycled candy wrapper bracelets, recycled aluminum bottles, and books about recycling.

Andrea Barnard, program coordinator in International Programs and Services, said, "We decided to celebrate Earth Day because it is one thing that applies to all of our students. Taking care of the earth and preserving it is something we all have in common."

The event is supported by a portion of an Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM) grant Residence Life received last year to establish a recycling program in campus housing. Areas near apartments and residence halls will soon be equipped with large bins for aluminum, plastic, and paper.

Greg Wagoner, assistant director of Residence Life (facilities) and coordinator for the recycling program, has ensured that the 2008-2009 Student Handbook will include information about the benefits of recycling, such as conserving resources like trees and water, and keeping materials out of landfills.

"Ultimately, the University will see a decrease in costs because of the amount of material not going into the dumpsters," he said.

The entire USI community, family, and friends are invited to attend the Earth Day Celebration, and children are welcome. Come learn what you can do to preserve the environment.

Jamie Johnson is a 2008 Goldwater Scholar

USI junior chemistry major **Jamie Johnson** is among 321 college students nationwide and 11 Hoosier students to be named a 2008 Goldwater Scholar. The Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship and Excellence in Education Foundation selected the award winners on the basis of academic merit from a field of 1,035 mathematics, science, and engineering students nominated by the faculties of colleges and universities throughout the country.

Sophomores and juniors are eligible for nomination. The one- and two-year scholarships cover the cost of tuition, fees, books, and room and board up to a maximum of \$7,500 per year.

Johnson maintains a 4.0 grade-point average. She plans to pursue a career as a physician.

In 2007, she was appointed by Indiana Governor Mitch Daniels to serve a two-year term as the student representative to the USI Board of Trustees.

"I cannot express how much I've enjoyed learning about the inner workings of the University," she said, regarding her service as student representative, "but the people I've met mean the most."

Johnson has conducted undergraduate research with Dr. Cindy M. Basinski, an Evansville obstetrician/gynecologist, since summer 2007. Under Basinski's supervision, she completed research related to the Essure method of female sterilization, a method that requires no incision and no general anesthesia. Johnson has prepared a paper on her findings for submission to a professional journal.

Johnson also served as a research assistant to Dr. Kenneth E. Walsh, assistant professor of chemistry. She presented findings of a study relating to carbohydrates at a local meeting of the American Chemical Society (ACS) and will make a presentation in August at the ACS National Meeting and Exposition in Philadelphia. She also is presenting the research at the RISC Showcase.

Dr. Mark D. Krahling, director of the University Core Curriculum and associate professor of chemistry, nominated Johnson for the Goldwater Scholarship. He said she has excelled in a rigorous technical curriculum.

"Jamie was one of the standouts in chemistry seminar," he said. "She demonstrated superior writing ability, and particularly excelled at presenting technical seminars. Many students find these presentations unnerving, but Jamie demonstrated knowledge, poise, and self-confidence, even under a barrage of questions from faculty."

Johnson is a member of the USI chapter of the American Chemical Society and co-founder and president of the USI Pre-Health Professions Club. She has been elected to serve a third term next year as administrative vice president for academic affairs for the Student Government Association.

The Goldwater Foundation was established by Congress in 1986. The Goldwater Scholarship was designed to foster and encourage outstanding students to pursue careers in the fields of mathematics, the natural sciences, and engineering.

USI College of Business programs reaccredited by AACSB

The College of Business at USI has again earned accreditation of its undergraduate and graduate business programs and separate accreditation of its accounting programs by AACSB International - The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business.

USI received initial AACSB accreditation for its undergraduate and graduate business programs in 1997. The accounting program achieved separate accreditation in 2003. Accredited schools must be re-evaluated every five years to maintain accreditation.

As of April, 458 institutions in the United States hold AACSB business accreditation, of which 163 have additional specialized accreditation for their accounting programs.

Dr. Mohammed Khayum, dean of the College of Business said, "Extension of accreditation by the AACSB International is a clear affirmation of the high quality of business and accounting programs offered by our University. We have established that we are among a distinctive group of business schools worldwide with both business and accounting accreditation. Of the more than 7,600 business schools in the world only 7 percent have AACSB business accreditation.

"Extension of accreditation demonstrates that our programs have attained a high level of overall quality, that we have a culture that is committed to continuous improvement, and that we are providing educational experiences that lead to measurable student learning outcomes. These outcomes suggest that our students are well positioned to respond to the challenges and opportunities of a dynamic and competitive global economy."

Dr. Linda Bennett, USI provost and vice president for Academic Affairs, said, "USI's College of Business has a growing reputation for excellence and AACSB accreditation confirms the outstanding work by the college's administrative team, faculty, and staff. I'm certain that even with this achievement, the faculty in the college are already thinking about ways to develop new initiatives and new partnerships in the region."

To achieve accreditation, business programs must satisfy the expectations of a wide range of quality standards relating to strategic management of resources, interactions of faculty and students in the educational process, and achievement of learning goals in degree programs.

During the reaccreditation process, the USI College of Business was visited in February by a team of evaluators with detailed knowledge of management education, applying accreditation standards that are widely accepted in the educational community.

AACSB International is an association of more than 1,100 educational institutions, businesses, and other organizations in 70 countries. The organization is the longest serving and largest global accrediting body for business schools that offer undergraduate, master's, and doctoral degrees in business and accounting.

Growing...Building: Recreation and Fitness Center expansion work begins soon

A groundbreaking ceremony for a 44,000 square foot addition to the University of Southern Indiana's Recreation and Fitness Center will be held at 3 p.m. Wednesday, April 16, on the Recreation and Fitness Center outdoor courts (inside if there is rain).

This second phase of construction, planned before the original building opened in 2000, will double the square footage and transform the Recreation and Fitness Center into a community spa with two new lounge areas, including a quiet area for studying.

In addition, the improved facility will include a rock climbing tower surrounded by glass walls, enabling climbers to be viewed from all three floors, and an 8-foot-tall bouldering wall.

(Bouldering, a branch of rock climbing, requires technical skill and provides a challenging workout.)

There will be two group exercise rooms that will allow for more classes; a game room with pool, foosball, air hockey tables, table tennis, and television sets for game systems; rooms dedicated to stretching (including a stretching area along side the existing track); a larger cardio room; a combative room with punching bags, restling mats and the like; a health assessment room; two locker rooms; and new and additional office space.

Most of the cardio machines and weight training equipment will be replaced with new, and more fitness equipment will be added. The current cardio and weight training areas will be converted into a third basketball court with a new wooden floor.

The addition will be constructed on the hillside area between the current building and the Recreation and Fitness Center parking lot and should not disrupt operations at the facility. Total costs for the project are about \$7.75 million, with the debt to be paid by student fees.

The groundbreaking will include various demonstration stations introducing the Recreation and Fitness Center's new features and including an architect's rendering of the features. Light refreshments will be served.

Contractors are Arc Construction, Peyronnin Construction, and Mel-Kay Electric. The architect is Jack R. Kinkel & Son Architects. Work is expected to be complete by fall 2009.

All continuing and readmission students are eligible to register online, but are urged to first meet with their academic advisor to review their course selection prior to registering. Contact your advisor to schedule an appointment (subject to availability).

Degree-seeking undergraduate students with less than 32 earned hours (freshmen) will have a registration hold placed on their record, and will be eligible for registration only after meeting with their academic advisor to review their course selection and remove the registration hold.

Degree-seeking undergraduates who began at USI in summer 1995 or later should review their Degree Evaluation (through MyUSI) prior to registration to check their progress toward degree completion and verify acceptable course options.

Students who sign up for classes during Priority Registration will not be billed until Monday, August 10, and expected to settle their account with the Bursar's Office by Wednesday, August 20.
