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Human rights activist to present lecture

An acclaimed author, activist, journalist, and scholar will deliver University of Southern Indiana's 2002 Sydney Berger Lecture March 13.

Dr. Scott Christianson will present "The Justice Boomerang" at 7:30 p.m. in Mitchell Auditorium. In his lecture, Christianson will discuss why the nation's reliance on punitive policies including imprisonment and the death penalty - is unjust, counterproductive, and harmful to society, as well as what can be done to promote positive change.

A proponent of criminal justice reform for more than 30 years, Christianson is the author of With Liberty for Some: 500 Years of Imprisonment in America (Northeastern 1998) and Condemned: Inside the Sing Sing Death House (NYU Press 2000).

Winner of Robert F. Kennedy Book Award Distinguished Honors, *With Liberty for Some* traces the history and meaning of imprisonment in America from Columbus to the present day.

In *Condemned*, Christianson uses official state files to expose the inner workings of Sing Sing, where 614 people were legally executed between 1891 and 1963. The book and its companion documentary exhibition have received worldwide acclaim.

A graduate of University of Connecticut, Christianson studied investigative reporting at Columbia University's American Press Institute. He holds an M.A. and Ph.D. from State University of New York at Albany, where he directed the Center on Minorities and Criminal Justice.

A resident of Albany, N.Y., he is a visiting associate professor of social studies at Bard College. His teaching credits also include SUNY Albany, Union College, and Rensselaer Polytechnic.

In his 20s, he was profiled as "one of the nation's top 20 investigative reporters," filing stories with *The New York Times, Washington Post, The Nation,* and *The Village Voice,* as well as the broadcast media. He has made numerous appearances on the History Channel, CBS, ABC, the BBC, and NPR.

Before dedicating his time to writing and teaching, Christianson held several positions in New York state's criminal justice system, including director of prison investigations for the state's corrections watchdog agency, executive assistant to the director of criminal justice, deputy director of probation and correctional alternatives, and deputy director of parole operations. From 1983 to 1989, he served as an aide to Gov. Mario Cuomo.

■ March 22 - Ulysses' Gaze (1995 Greece) Directed by Theo Angelopoulos. Starring Harvey Keitel, Maria Morgenstern. A meditation on observation versus participation, Ulysses' Gaze follows an exiled Greek filmmaker's return to his native Ptolemas to attend a screening of one of his controversial films. A personal odyssey begins as he winds his way through the war-torn landscape in search of the - perhaps mythical - first film footage ever shot in the Balkans.

March 29 - Women from the Lake of Scented Souls (1993 China) Written/Directed by Fei Xie. Starring Baoguo Chen, Gaowa Siqin. Filled with moments of "intoxicating beauty" and "devastating despair," Women from the Lake of Scented Souls focuses on Xiang as she runs a rural sesame seedoil producing business with little help from her lazy, drunken husband and mentally-retarded son. When a Japanese businesswoman offers to distribute the oil, Xiang's exhausting life, and the lives of those around her, are changed forever.

■ April 5 - Bamboozled (2000 United States) Directed by Spike Lee. Starring Damon Wayans, Jada Pinkett Smith, Savion Glover. An extremely biting, controversial satire of television, its executives, and the way they use and misuse images of African Americans in a mindless quest for ratings, Bamboozled follows Pierre Delacroix – Wayans as a Harvard graduate and cable-network programming executive - who is off-handedly accused of "not being black enough."

■ April 12 - Sunshine (2001 Hungary) Directed by Istvan Szabo. Starring Ralph Fiennes, Rachel Weisz, William Hurt. An epic account of the turmoil of the 20th century seen through the lives of three generations of a Jewish-Hungarian family, Sunshine (with Fiennes playing multiple roles) explores the complexity of forces that inform life's choices and the difficulty of knowing in any moment whether to choose ethics or expediency.
