DELIVERY SERVICE FOR DUPLICATING AND COPY CENTER JOBS NOW AVAILABLE. A need for the delivery of Duplicating and Copy Center requests and completed jobs has become evident since the Duplicating Service relocated in the Technology Center, Room 124, and the Copy Center began operation. Therefore, effective October 8, 1975, the campus mail service includes in their mail runs deliveries of completed duplicating and copy center jobs to your Division/Department.

According to William Muller, Purchasing Agent, "The Copy Center is also available for service while you wait on normal jobs, or Copy Center requests received by 10:00 a.m. will be delivered by 4:00 p.m. of the same day. The Copy Center will run copies from 1 to 500 and has collating and stapling services available upon request. We hope this delivery service will save you time by eliminating trips to the Technology Center to deliver or pick-up Duplicating or Copy Center jobs," adds Mr. Muller. "The mail service is asking your cooperation by signing for receipt of the completed jobs as quickly as possible, so this delivery service will not slow down the regular mail deliveries."

RENEWAL OF BLUE CROSS-BLUE SHIELD MASTER CONTRACT. The Blue Cross-Blue Shield master contract has been renewed for 1975-76 effective July 10, 1975. The premium rates have been increased 3.2% for single coverage and 6.4% for family coverage. The University has assumed the full cost of the premium increase. A comparison of the premium rate for 1974-75 and 1975-76 is as follows:
