EMPLOYEE PORTRAIT. Linda Skinner, a library assistant in charge of the Learning Resources Center, is a woman of varied interests and combines her educational skills with her interests in animals and young people.

A graduate of the University of Evansville, Linda received a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1974 and came to ISUE in 1976 to work as a secretary/clerk in media services and film booking. She became the library assistant in charge of the Learning Resources Center about 1 1/2 years ago. As with her life outside her job at the Library, the center provides her with a wide variety of challenges.

The Learning Resources Center is composed of two areas. The Teaching Materials Center consists primarily of textbooks for all subjects and age levels, instructional media production facilities and independent study areas for use by education majors in their teacher-education courses. The Skills Development Lab includes the Writing Workshop, the Math Clinic and individual tutoring in addition to self-paced materials for improvement of basic skills, such as math, reading, writing and study skills.

Linda comments, "Our purpose is not to have several copies of each material used, but to branch out and have hundreds of samples of educational materials available for students to check out and see what works best for them. I try to keep on top of new media and materials that companies might be introducing and often send for materials to be previewed by the LRC and faculty." Currently, Linda is working on increasing college-level holdings, especially those used for independent learning situations such as an algebra or history module that helps individuals sharpen their skills.

Linda and her staff have almost completed re-cataloging the various samples of the LRC - a job that has taken almost a year and a half. In addition to working with the materials of the LRC, Linda and her student staff are responsible for booking ISUE-owned films and coordinating the 14 display cases of the Library. She also works in several capacities on the Library staff when needed.

Linda's first love is horses, and she and her family have owned and trained horses for years. She is slowly working her husband Ron into the same interests. They now own one horse, Joker's Wild Kard, and hope to show him next year in addition to acquiring another horse. They also are raising Doberman Pinschers for breeding and plan to get their "champion dog degree" this spring. Linda is one of 15 4-H Horse and Pony leaders who share the responsibility of working with about 100 4-H-ers aged 10-18 who are interested in raising horses and ponies. The animals they work with range from small Western ponies to purebred American Saddle horses worth thousands of dollars. Linda has competed in horse and pony events for 17 years and is in tune with these students and their needs. She says of these young people "They are here because they want to be--that makes the difference. It's why I enjoy working with them. We hold meetings once monthly and try to schedule several events that are not related to competition. Too much competition sometimes spoils the fun."

Beyond these activities, Linda is currently completing a biology minor and is working part-time on her master's degree in Physical Education.
