VOICES, INC. TO APPEAR AT ISUE. A two-act musical drama production, "Journey Into Blackness," will be presented at Indiana State University Evansville by Voices, Inc. on February 9 at 11:00 a.m. The production, sponsored by the Human Relations Institute and the Division of Humanities, expresses the Black experience from Africa to today in song, drama, and dance. The production includes a cast of eight, accompanied by persons on piano and drums.

"Journey Into Blackness" travels a musical route along an historical line of progress. Since the first slave days at Jamestown, Virginia in 1619, the Black man frequently expressed himself in song. That tradition, from Africa, through enslavement, and into the liberation struggle of today, still exists. That gift of song has flourished side by side with a unique language, freedom in body movement, and an abiding humor. That is the life style portrayed by Voices, Inc. in "Journey Into Blackness."

Critics describe the show in these terms: "The voices have plenty to say and do it with dignity and an exceptional amount of musical talent." "...and the singing -- particularly the choral singing -- is beautiful and stirring."

The production is open to faculty, staff, and students, and the general public. There is no admission fee.

TEACHER EDUCATION PROGRAMS RECEIVE FIVE-YEAR APPROVAL. The Commission on Teacher Training and Licensing of the Indiana State Department of Public Instruction has granted a five-year approval of all teacher education programs at Indiana State University Evansville. This is the maximum time for approving programs. The Commission accepted recommendations of a six-member visitation team made up of university personnel, public school teachers and administration, and representatives from the State Department of Public Instruction who visited the campus in November.

In the report of the Commission, the visitation team commended ISUE for the physical facility supporting the instructional program, and for the University's efforts to provide needed services for the geographical area. In addition, the Laboratory Experiences Program, which allows freshman students access to classroom teaching, was highly commended.

RADIOLOGIC TECHNOLOGY PROGRAM ACCREDITED. The Radiologic Technology Program at Indiana State University Evansville has received preliminary accreditation to the Council on Medical Education of the American Medical Association. The program was reviewed by the Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology for the Council. The program is offered in affiliation with Deaconess Hospital. The program is an Associate Degree program, training radiologic technicians who work in hospitals and medical offices.

HUMANITIES FORUM. Susan Donaldson, Associate Professor of Psychology, will be the featured speaker for the next Humanities Forum scheduled for Thursday, February 5. Dr. Donaldson will be speaking on "Sex" at 11:00 a.m. in the Rare Books Room.

On Wednesday, February 11, Melvin Denner, Associate Professor of Life Science, will discuss the outlook, the interrelationships, and the problems of fossil fuels, atomic energy, plasma, and food as they affect an expanding world population. "Energy Crises" will be presented by Dr. Denner at 11:00 a.m. in Room A28.

STUDENT UNION BOARD FILM. The Student Union Board will present the film, "Straw Dogs," starring Dustin Hoffman, on Friday, February 6, at 8:00 p.m. in A126. Cost for students will be \$1.00, and \$1.50 for non-students. A ten-minute Marx Brothers film will precede the main attraction.

INSTITUTE IN THE HUMANITIES.
