



VIETNAM VETERANS WORKSHOP TO BE HELD IN MAY. A three-day workshop for Vietnam veterans will be held at ISUE on May 15 - 17. The workshop is co-sponsored by the Evansville Courier, ISUE, the Nam Vets organization, and the Evansville Vet Center.

The workshop will offer participants the opportunity to hear from nationally-known experts in the areas of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, Operation Outreach, counseling minority Vietnam

veterans, counseling families, employment and small business opportunities, and Agent Orange.

There also will be an opportunity for Vietnam-era veterans and their families to hear from local service and agency representatives about community resources currently available for Vietnam-era veterans.

The major purposes of the workshop are (1) to enhance existing services for Vietnam veterans, (2) to make Vietnam veterans and their families aware of the issues and services available, (3) to contribute to the general body of knowledge available on Vietnam-era veterans, and (4) to enhance their image in the community.

According to Gary May, team leader at the Evansville Vet Center, the workshop grew out of an idea by Bill Jackson, editor of the Evansville Courier, to provide some type of public recognition for Vietnam veterans. Major funding is being provided by the Evansville Courier. The workshop will be open to all interested persons and no fee will be charged for admission. It is hoped that veterans from throughout the Midwest will attend.

The announcement of the workshop comes at a time when there is much talk of seriously curtailing or eliminating federally-funded programs for Vietnam-era veterans and their families. At the same time, there is nationally growing recognition of some of the special problems encountered by Vietnam veterans upon their return from the war. This awareness has led to programs such as Operation Outreach which established the Vet Center in Evansville and other cities. It also accounts for the recent proliferation of community-based Vietnam veterans service organizations, such as Nam Vets in Evansville.

ISUE JOINS IN GALLERY OF THE ARTS PROGRAM. During the week of April 5 - 11, Indiana State University Evansville join several hundred other state colleges and universities across the nation in presenting more than 1,000 concerts, plays, seminars, exhibitions, lectures, readings, and shows to celebrate and dramatize their role as cultural centers for communities throughout the nation.

Organized by the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and funded in part by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, this program seeks both to illustrate and enhance the role of state colleges and universities as regional cultural centers by attracting greater audiences within the communities, by expanding the variety and number of presentations on the calendar, and by establishing a network of community support groups for the arts in the community and region.

Events scheduled by ISUE as part of the Gallery of Arts Program include a Student Art Exhibition from April 5 - 12 and a three-part Humanities Forum on Wednesday, April 8. The Student Art Exhibition will begin with a reception from 1:00 - 4:00 p.m. on the ISUE University Center Bridge, on Sunday, April 5. Tuition scholarships and merit awards totalling more than \$2,000 will be awarded to participants in this year's Tenth Annual Student Art Exhibition. Bob Evans, chairman of the ISU Art Department, will judge the event. As part of the Humanities Forum scheduled for Wednesday, April 8, a guitar concert will be presented by Inge Erlach and Benjamin Bunch at noon in TC212. At 1:00 p.m., John McNaughton, ISUE professor of art, will present an art lecture entitled "Furniture Can Be Sculpture" in TC109. The third part of the Humanities Forum will be a reading presented by Gladys Swan, a fiction writer, at 2:00 p.m. in L100.

NEWS FORUM: DISPOSAL OF HAZARDOUS WASTE IN INDIANA. ISUE, via the Indiana Higher Education Telecommunication System (IHETS), will receive a news forum entitled "Hazardous Wastes: The Indiana Situation". The news forum will be received in SC194 from 1:30 - 3:00 p.m. (Evansville time) on Thursday, April 2. All interested persons are invited to attend.

The forum will provide news reporters with an overview of the problem in Indiana and background information on how this growing story might be reported more effectively. Participating in the news forum will be Anthony W. Leffin, Indiana coordinator for the EPA Region V office in Chicago; Professor Donald A. Hendrickson of the Ball State University biology department; and a representative of Indiana industries. According to the U.S. EPA, Indiana is the 10th largest producer of industrial hazardous wastes, but no disposal site that meets federal standards exists in Indiana.

FREE CONCERT. The Evansville Philharmonic Chorus, Chamber Singers, and Orchestra will present a free concert on Friday, April 10, at Holy Rosary Catholic Church. "Great Anthems of the Church" will begin at 8:00 p.m. The concert is open to the public.
