Dr. Marie Hankins, chair of the USI Chemistry Department, will conduct chemical demonstrations -- exploding balloons, flaming bubbles, elephant toothpaste, the banana hammer, disappearing peanuts, burning water, and more -- at 1:30 p.m. and oversee hands-on activity at 2:30 p.m. Sunday, November 3, at Washington Square Mall, Evansville, launching the local observance of National Chemistry Week, November 3-10.

The Indiana/Kentucky Border Section, American Chemical Society (ACS) is the primary sponsor of the week's activities, aimed at enhancing public awareness of the contributions of chemistry in our everyday lives and in the nation's economy.
