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USI OPEN HOUSE. The University's annual Open House and Southern Hospitality Day will be held Sunday, October 19, with campus tours -- either walking or by trolley -- and a variety of activities to be available from 12 noon to 3 p.m. for current and prospective students, their families and friends, and the general public. Among the activities will be:

Admissions Office Southern Hospitality Day -- University Center; brief presentation for prospective students at 12:30 p.m.

Apple Butter Stir -- Eicher Barn, all day; USI Secretaries and Associates Club members will sell apple butter, noon-3 p.m.

Aquatic Eagles Swim Meet -- Physical Activities Center, 7 a.m.-5 p.m.

Business Clubs -- Forum Wing and computer labs, 12 noon-3 p.m.; members of Accounting Club, Marketing Club, Personnel Club, American Management Society, National Collegiate Association of Secretaries, and Data Processing Management Association will demonstrate equipment, including computers and word processors, and have displays of their work; League of Professional Women club members will greet visitors and serve as ushers.

Engineering Technology -- Technology Center; Computer Aided Design Laboratory demonstrations of microcomputer- and minicomputer-based CAD systems, noon-3 p.m.; quicksand and surveying equipment demonstrations, noon-3 p.m.; plastic tension testing demonstrations, 1-3 p.m.; concrete cylinder testing, 2-2:15 p.m. The model of the USI/American Society of Mechanical Engineers paddlewheel boat also will be on display, 1-3 p.m.

Library -- student art exhibits and "String Art," slide presentations of students in class, displays of student papers from various divisions, commemorative display of the Statue of Liberty; also, microcomputer demonstrations in the Computer Literacy Center and several displays of student achievement in the Learning Resources Center -- exhibitions which won first- and third-place honors in a state radiologic technology competition, video tapes of USI Theatre students' one-act plays, and biology students' fish survey in Pigeon Creek. Health and science textbooks presented for adoption in Indiana this year will be available for perusal.

Mid-America Singers -- Forum I, 12:30 and 2 p.m.; the USI singers will present 25-minute programs of pop, country, and easy-listening music.

Power Plant -- noon-3 p.m.; demonstration of central control console.

Science and Math -- Science Center, 1-3 p.m.; demonstrations in the chemical instrumentation room (SC93) and a "Natural History of Molecular Biology" presentation (SC91).

University Center -- Various clubs and organizations will have displays on their activities and achievements. **Financial Aids** will have an information table and **Health Services** will be in the Snack Bar, providing free blood pressure checks and health information.

In conjunction with the USI Open House, **Solarbron Pointe Retirement Center** also will hold an Open House from 1 to 3 p.m. to allow area residents to view the facilities available there for senior citizens. The Center is located on McDowell Road, west of the campus, and can be reached via an extension of the University Boulevard.

UNITED WAY CAMPAIGN OPENS MONDAY. The University's 1986-87 United Way campaign will get under way Monday, October 20, with a special incentive offered this year in support of the "Fair Share" theme for contributions. Two drawings are being organized and will be open only to "Fair Share" donors: faculty members will be eligible for a drawing to receive a \$100 supplemental stipend to attend a professional meeting of their choice; administrative and support staff members will be eligible for a drawing to receive a "Fair Share Day Off." The prizes must be used during the 1986-87 fiscal year.

The USI employee goal this year is \$7,500. Letters detailing the campaign and the "Fair Share" ratios will be distributed. **Ms. Debbie Warren**, engineering drafter at the Physical Plant, is campus chairman of the campaign with a committee of 16 fellow employees assisting her as United Way campaign contacts in the various divisions and offices. **Mrs. Suzanne Nicholson**, director of Development and Alumni Affairs, is the campaign advisor.

SIGMA TAU DELTA CHAPTER BEING CHARTERED AT USI. The English Department is proud to announce it has been selected as the newest site for a chapter of the nation's only National Honor Society in English, Sigma Tau Delta. The USI chapter, Mu Phi, will be installed at 3 p.m. Thursday, October 16, in the President's Suite at the University Center. Those invited to be initiated are English majors and minors of upper-class standing who have at least a B average in language and literature and who are ranked in the upper 30 percent of their class. English faculty members will be initiated as associate members.

Sigma Tau Delta was founded in 1924 and now has more than 300 chapters and 50,000 members. The society seeks to (1) confer distinction for high scholarship and achievement in language and literature, (2) promote inter-

est in language and literature on campuses as well as surrounding communities, and (3) foster the discipline of English in all of its cultural settings and in thinking, reading, speaking, and, particularly, creative and critical writing.

COMMUNITY OF SCHOLARS LECTURER. Dr. H. Laurence Ross, a sociology professor and author of the widely acclaimed book, Deterring the Drinking Driver, will open the 1986-87 Community of Scholars series in a program sponsored by the Division of Social Science. Dr. Ross will speak to several classes in the division on Friday, October 17, and Monday, October 20, and will deliver a free public lecture, "Our Misguided Drunk Driving Policy," at 7:30 p.m. Monday in Forum I. His visit in the University series designed to broaden the scope of learning and thought for USI students and the community has been arranged by Dr. Joseph Palladino, assistant professor of psychology.

EXECUTIVE-IN-RESIDENCE. Mr. John J. Bolger, a USI graduate who now is senior vice president and assistant to the president at CrediThrift, will be the Executive-in-Residence Monday, October 20, in the fall semester program sponsored by the Division of Business. He will lead morning and afternoon discussion programs and be the featured speaker for a noon luncheon. All sessions will be held at the University Center and are open to the public. The program is designed to stimulate students' thinking and broaden their education through discussion and interaction with executives in business, industry and government.

NAMES IN THE NEWS. Dr. Sang T. Choe, associate professor of marketing, and Dr. Robert E. Gehring, associate professor of psychology, were the co-authors of an article in the book, Marketing in a Dynamic Environment, published by the Atlantic Marketing Association in 1986. The article, "Marketing Implications of Foreign and American Students' Shopping Patterns," focused largely on the consumption of agricultural products.

Dr. Walter W. Jermakowicz, associate professor of business, was a lecturer on "Comparative Management Systems" October 9 and 10 at Carleton College in Northfield, Minnesota. He delivered two lectures, "The Evolution of Macro-Management Systems in Czechoslovakia, East Germany, Poland, and the USSR, 1944-1984" and "Stability and Instability of Management and Political Systems in the USSR."

The Proceedings of the Tenth Mid-America Conference on Composition -- held on the theme, "Literature and Composition: Bridging the Gap" -- have been published by the University. Dr. Thomas M. Rivers, USI professor of English, served as chair of the conference, which was co-sponsored by USI and Historic New Harmony, Inc., and as editor of the proceedings. COMPUTER CENTER EXPANDING DISK SELECTION. The Computer Literacy Training/Preview Center has become a member of PC-Sig, an organization that distributes public domain and user-supported software for the IBM PC and its compatibles. The membership allows the USI center to purchase their collection at a low price. About 40 PC-Sig disks covering a variety of subject areas now are available, including word processing, database, spreadsheet, statistical, and Basic programming programs. The USI center also has several utility programs and educational games, plus public domain programs for Commodore 64, Apple, and TRS-80 computers. A complete list of available items may be obtained by calling extension 1954. Interested persons may take blank disks to the center to obtain free copies. Ms. Becky Warford, center coordinator, will be available from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday to assist you. Additional public domain and commercial software will be purchased throughout the year and will be announced in University Notes.

TESTING PROGRAM INITIATED. USI students who plan on teaching careers encountered a new requirement this fall as the Division of Education implemented a new standard in its commitment to excellence. To be admitted to USI's teacher education programs, students must pass a basic skills examination in reading comprehension, writing, and mathematics, in addition to maintaining a 2.5 grade point average on a 4.0 scale. Dr. Robert E. Mays, director of the program, states: "The new standard says to prospective teachers that it is the intent of the Division of Education to focus on the academic quality of their performance, and represents our continued interest in improving both the quality of teacher education and teaching in schools."
