



## MOVING FINGER CAPTURES FIVE AWARDS.

The Indiana Collegiate Press Association gave five "Awards of Merit" to ISUE's literary magazine, The Moving Finger, at its annual convention at Butler University April 16. The magazine received First Place for Best Non-Photographic Art and Copy Combination; Second Place for Best Non-Photographic Art; Second Place for Best Cover Design; Honorable Mention for Best Short Poem; and Honorable Mention for Best Overall Makeup.

The Spring, 1976 and Fall, 1977 issues were entered in the competition. David Osterman was editor and Jane Osgatharp was assistant editor of those issues; Miss Osgatharp is editor of the Spring, 1977 issue which will go on sale next week on campus. The Award of Merit indicates an "extremely high level of performance" according to the Indiana Collegiate Press Association. Last year, the magazine won three awards.

**UNIVERSITY SINGERS CONCERT, SATURDAY.** The University Singers of Indiana State University Evansville will present a spring concert on Saturday, April 30, at 8:00 p.m. in the Forum at ISUE. The 25-voice choir was newly formed this year by ISUE's Director of Music, DR. JON O. CARLSON, to explore serious choral literature.

The Singers will open with selections from Brahms "Liebeslieder" or "Love Song" Waltzes Opus 52. PATTY SCHAEFER and KATHERINE MOORE will be featured as duo piano accompanists. The second number on the program is a choral piece called "Ezekiel" by Gerald Kemner who is a composer on the faculty of the University of Missouri at Kansas City. The text is based on the parables found in the book of Ezekiel in the Bible. The Singers are accompanied by electronic tape featuring a synthesized jazz accompaniment. Vocal techniques employed are traditional singing, choric speaking, dissonant tone clusters, and glissandi.

The public is invited to attend. There is no admission fee.

**HUMANITIES FORUM.** Dr. John Wain, Fellow and Professor of Poetry at Brasenose College, Oxford University, England, will speak tonight at 8:00 p.m. in Room A34. His topic is "English Poetry in My Time."

**SUMMER SAILING.** A summer sailing course will be offered the week of May 8 at Kentucky Lake State Park for beginners or experienced sailors. The course, a part of the spring series of classes, is offered through the ISUE Continuing Education Office. It may be taken for one hour of credit.

THOMAS RIVERS, a member of the ISUE faculty and U.S. Power Squadron, will teach the course. Students will sail 21-foot cruisers and 13-foot daysailers.
