HUMANITIES FORUM. Mr. Langdon Morris, who will give a slide lecture "Toward Arcology: Works in Progress" will be the guest speaker at the Humanities Forum April 4 at 1:00 p.m. in the University Center, Room 350.

Of special interest to students of art, sociology and ecology, Morris will discuss the work of Paolo Soleri's Cosanti Foundation. The exhibit describes the research and development of an alternative urban environment.

The not-for-profit Cosanti Foundation, under the direction of architect Paolo Soleri, constructed Arcosanti in 1970 in the Mesa Country of central Arizona, 70 miles north of Phoenix. When completed, the town of 4500-5000 will serve as a study center for the social, economic and ecological implications of its architectural framework. At this time, over 2500 students and professionals of diversified ages and backgrounds have taught and learned from one another through the building of Arcosanti. Arcosanti yearly hosts a series of cultural events in both the visual and performing arts.

The foundation's recent focus is the development of a central system for the efficient collection, transmission and consumption of the solar energy needed to support the population of a town or city. The framework for research is a hypothetical arcology which uses terraced greenhouses surrounding the arcology as solar heat collectors, resulting in intensive food production and an energy support system which directs solar heat from the greenhouses to the arcology to meet basic heating and cooling needs for the town. Several projects currently under construction include a residential complex and a 25-meter swimming pool, which will be sunheated by the greenhouse and chimney effects.

Consisting of models and graphics, the Cosanti Foundation exhibit, housed in the Evansville Museum, will open Sunday, April 2. Morris will be present at the Museum that day and also give a slide lecture.

The session is free and open to the public.

NUCLEAR ENERGY DEBATE. In response to the hotly-debated issue of using nuclear energy as a substitute for the nation's dwindling natural resources, ISUE will present a two-part series on the pros and cons of nuclear energy.

The public is invited to attend these free sessions held on Thursday, March 30 and Thursday, April 6 at 7:00 p.m. in A34. The format each evening will include a lecture, followed by a question and answer session to enable persons attending to understand the issue and form an opinion.

Robert Norris from Public Service Indiana will present a session advocating the use of nuclear energy Thursday, March 30.

On April 7, TOM ZELLER, Instructor in Geology, will present the opposing view.

Co-sponsored by the Office of Continuing Education and the Division of Science and Math, the lectures are included in the continuing Environmental Problems and Solutions forum this spring.

MID AMERICA CONFERENCE ON COMPOSITION. Bernard Van't Hul, Director of the University of Michigan freshman composition program, will be the featured speaker at the Mid America Conference on Composition.

Held Wednesday, April 5, the conference will revolve around the theme "Back to Basics???" Van't Hul is expected to discuss the program at the University of Michigan, which is recognized as being one of the more innovative programs in composition.

As director of the freshman composition program, which enrolls over 3500 students annually, Van't Hul is responsible for on-going training seminars for faculty and graduate assistants who teach writing. Professor Van't Hul teaches graduate and undergraduate courses in Old and Middle English language and literature, history of the English language, freshman English, and advanced expository writing. In addition, he is Associate Research Editor of the University's Middle English Dictionary. In this capacity, he illustrates and defines the meaning of words of the English language as it was used for four hundred years before the advent of the printing press. He is also Chairman of the Consulting Committee of the English Composition Board which sets policy for entrance requirements and executes research in the teaching of writing.

Van't Hul is co-author of three language texts for junior-high students and has recently been named consultant to the Advanced Placement Committee of Educational Testing Service.

The conference, sponsored annually, is open to the public and particularly to interested teachers of English. In a move toward a coordinated writing program, the conference will provide opportunities for communication between teachers of English on the secondary and university levels.

Held in the University Center, registration will be from 3:30 p.m. - 9:00 p.m. The keynote address given by Van't Hul begins at 6:00 p.m.

Also offered is a series of minicourses on nutrition: Gardening and Preserving, Basic Nutrition, and Consumerism.
