PHOTOGRAPHY EXHIBIT AT THE LIBRARY. "The Civil War -- An Impression," an exhibit of photographs by Mr. Michael T. Schmidt of Owensboro, Kentucky and Mr. Dennis Kissel of Evansville will be on display at the USI Library through Thursday, July 3. The exhibit features re-enacted battles of the Civil War and includes two photographs of a battle re-enactment at USI in 1981. The 30-print exhibit attempts to convey the "feel" of images captured during the 1860 s by pioneering masters Mathew Brady and Timothy O'Sullivan, among others. It also explores what might have been if highspeed "stop action" emulsions had been available to early photographers.

KEY CONTROL. Past policy requiring that requests for keys be made by memorandum to the Vice President for Business Affairs has been changed. The new policy calls for division chairmen/department heads to make key requests via a work request (Form 69) to the Physical Plant superintendent. The "Description of Work" block should list the name and title of the individual to receive a key and justification for the request.

COMPUTER PRICING DATA. The Purchasing Department has the following price data from IBM: 5150 Model 166 with \#5l5l green monochrome display, one disk drive, $\$ 1,140 ; 5150$ Model 176 with \#5l5l green monochrome display, two disk drives, $\$ 1,190$. Both models include 256 K memory, keyboard, and monochrome display and printer adapter. If you want to replace the green monochrome monitor with a color monitor (\#5153), add \$342 for a total of $\$ 1,532$. DOS 3.1 is not in the package and can be purchased for $\$ 60$.
