The Chronicle of Philanthropy (<http://philanthropy.com>) presents the Web version of the newspaper of the nonprofit world. Offering its expertise in the areas of gifts and grants, fundraising, managing nonprofit groups, and technology, this resource helps nonprofit groups deal with a wide range of financial, accounting, and legal issues. Links connect you to information about conferences, workshops, and seminars, Internet resources, products and services, and jobs. *The Chronical of Philanthropy* is updated weekly but also provides access to past articles.

Make it a point to visit **National Geographic** (<http://www.nationalgeographic.com>). The current features include "Andes Expedition," which takes you into the Andes Mountains of Peru where the mummy of an Inca maiden preserved in ice for the past 500 years is discovered atop Mt. Ampato. This link also offers the opportunity to participate in a virtual autopsy of the mummy. Another feature, "Speed of

Sound," familiarizes you with the Bell X-1 flown by Chuck Yeager, who was the first to break the sound barrier as a young Air Force pilot in 1947. Click onto "Wave Soaring" and experience the thrill of flying a Twin Astor sailplane 39,000 feet above the Sierra Nevada. Become an eyewitness to the Salem witch trials of the late 1600s in "Salem Witchcraft Hysteria." In addition to these features, the site offers links to *National Geographic* magazine, the National Geographic Society, and other interesting connections. The "Kids" link is a fabulous place for children to visit, with features geared toward their interests. Updated regularly, the **National Geographic** home page is a most interesting and informative destination on the Web.

With Thanksgiving just around the corner, you will enjoy visiting **The First Thanksgiving** (<http://media3.com/>

plymouth/thanksgiving.htm) home page. A first-hand account of the actual event indicates the Thanksgiving feast in 1621 went on for three days, included 90 Native Americans, and offered a bounty of food. In the words of Edward Winslow, a leader of the colony, "although it be not always so plentiful as it was this time with us, yet by the goodness of God we are so far from want that we often wish you partakers of our plenty." Though this feast, which followed the Pilgrims' first harvest, was never repeated it has become the model for our own Thanksgiving celebration. Links connect you with the living museum in Plymouth, Massachusetts, that re-creates the lives of the Pilgrims including how their village looked, what the colonists wore, how they spoke, and other details of their daily lives. There is even a link to recipes that would have been available to the Pilgrims. This site offers a fascinating glimpse into the lives of the colonists and Native Americans of the early 1600s.
