**AMERICAN ISSUES FORUM.** The featured speaker for the American Issues Forum on Wednesday, April 21 is Dr. Joseph Baus of First Presbyterian Church. The topic of the Forum will be "In God We Trust: American Civil Religion." Concluding the American Issues Forum for April will be Donald McNary, Director, Human Relations Commission. Mr. McNary will discuss "A Sense of Belonging: The Meaning of Community in America" on Wednesday, April 28. A speaker is presented each Wednesday evening at 7:30 p.m. in A34.

**HUMANITIES FORUM.** Concluding the Humanities Forum for April will be a performance by The String Quartet of the Evansville Philharmonic Orchestra on Thursday, April 22 at 1:00 p.m. in A126, and "Musical Antiques of the Temperance Movement," by Jon Carlson, Assistant Professor and Director of Music, on Wednesday, April 28 at 11:00 a.m. in A126. Sometimes referred to as an "Army of Cranks," the advocates of the Temperance Movement in the late 19th century stimulated the composition of a large body of songs extolling the merits of abstinence from alcohol and tobacco. "Musical Antiques" will reflect a variety of musical styles and approaches to the temperance cause. The Mid-America Singers will sing a selection of these songs with prefacing remarks by Dr. Carlson.

**HORIZON '76 PROGRAM.** "Offering a comprehensive understanding of community values, problems and forces, and helping prepare people to effectively shape Evansville's future, is the goal of Horizon '76," according to George Abshier, Professor of Business and Coordinator of the Horizon '76 program. Horizon '76 is a seminar, open to the public, that will focus on Evansville and its future.

In five evening seminars, community leaders and faculty of ISUE will discuss the forces that have shaped Evansville metropolitan growth; how others view Evansville people and how we view ourselves; and aspects of growth for Evansville in the next century. Thirty-two people will participate as commentators, reactors, and moderators for this special series. These people represent a wide range of expertise from newspaper reporters to businessmen and government officials to faculty members and civic leaders. Members of the audience will be encouraged to participate in the discussion.

**HORIZON '76 PROGRAM, CONTINUED.** The first session, offered on April 22, 1976 will concentrate on "The Forces Which Have Made Evansville What It Is." It will be conducted by Dale Shook, Assistant Professor of Business. The series is open to the public with no admission fee. All seminars will begin at 7:00 p.m. and will be held in A126.

**BICENTENNIAL CONVOCATION.** The Social Science Division is sponsoring an interdisciplinary convocation in commemoration of the Bicentennial observance during the month of April, according to Daniel Miller, Chairman of the Social Science Division. The final presentation in this series will take place on Friday, April 23 at 2:00 p.m. in the Rare Books Room. Eric vonFuhrmann, Assistant Professor of English, will present "Minority Participation in the Bicentennial -- Full, Little, or Not at All." The series is open to the general public. Following the exchange of ideas and opinions by the panel members, the audience will be invited to participate in the discussion.

**MID-AMERICA SINGERS' SPRING SHOW.** The Mid-America Singers will present their annual Spring Show on Friday, April 23, and Saturday, April 24 at 7:30 p.m. at the ISUE Theatre. The Mid-America Singers will be featuring eight new numbers added to their repertoire this year.

Among the selections to be heard are "Love Is All Around," "A Friend Like You" with featured soloist DeeAnn Williams, "Let It Be Me" with featured soloists Pete Helfrich, vocalist, and Jerry Ludwig, trumpet, "Besame Mucho" and "Operator" with featured soloists, Kimberly Hinton, vocalist, and Gary Ray, sax. In addition, the Mid-America Singers will present their popular "64" and "Riviera." The Singers will also perform Temperance Songs in honor of the Bicentennial. A special Bicentennial salute to George M. Cohan will be the show's rousing finale.

The Mid-America Stage Band will back up the Singers as well as perform several selections on their own. This year the Band has been expanded to include saxophones and has approached the "Big Band Sound." Selections to be presented by the Band are "In a Little Groove," "Mother Fingers" with featured soloists Stan Gregory, trumpet, David Waltz, and Ty Buttrum, guitar, "One's Company, Two's a Chord," and "Hurt So Bad" with Stephanie Pearson, vocalist. The entire show is under the direction of Jon Carlson, Assistant Professor and Director of Music.

One hundred and nineteen pieces were accepted into the show from over 250 submitted entries. David Herrold of DePauw University judged the student show. Fifteen students received special awards and scholarships. The Student Art Exhibit will be on display through April '28 in the University Center.
