UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN INDIANA  
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**NCAA CROSS COUNTRY NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS.** USI will host the NCAA Division II Cross Country National Championships on Saturday, November 21, at Oak Meadow Golf and Country Club. There will be 11 women's teams and 17 men's teams competing, with the women embarking on their 5,000-meter run at 9:30 a.m. and the men starting their 10,000-meter run at 10:15 a.m. Parking arrangements have been changed for the championships, with facilities at Camp Reveal on Boonville-New Harmony Road to be used on Saturday. Shuttle buses again will take fans to Oak Meadow. Only the participants with parking permits may park at Oak Meadow.

The top 25 runners Saturday will earn All-American status. USI finished second in the NCAA Division II regional competition November 7 at Oak Meadow Golf and Country Club, qualifying for the national championships. **James Little** led the USI team, completing the 10,000-meter course in 32 minutes, 12 seconds, to win sixth place among the 121 runners from 20 Division II schools. Southeast Missouri State took first place and a fourth consecutive regional title. The top two men's teams (SEMO and USI) and top two individuals (Art Waddle of SEMO and Anthony Vodicka of Lewis) qualified for the nationals. The women's 5,000-meter competition was won by Ferris State, with Southeast Missouri coming in second.

Tickets to the national championships are \$2 for adults and \$1 for students. Let's all turn out to support the Cross Country team and USI's sponsorship of this NCAA national event!

**CHRISTMAS MADRIGAL FEASTES DECEMBER 3-6.** The 1987 Christmas season will arrive December 3 on the USI campus, when the splendor of song and the pomp of tradition -- the festive Christmas Madrigal Feastes -- open in the University Center Dining Room. A yuletide celebration reminiscent of centuries past, the Christmas Madrigal Feastes include the traditional old English roast beef dinner brought to guests by serving wenches and liveried servants. There is continuous entertainment by the talented troupe of Mid-America Singers in an authentically staged Dining Hall bedecked with Renaissance style garlands and banners. The Madrigals are directed by **Mrs. Sue Schriber**, USI director of music, and produced by her husband, **Mr. Jack Schriber**.

The feaste starts at 7:30 p.m. Thursday through Saturday, December 3-5, and at 6 p.m. on Sunday, December 6. The ticket price is \$15 per person; a special \$10 price is available for students and senior citizens for the Sunday performance only. This year, the special price also is being offered to the hearing impaired and a table will be reserved for them with interpreters available to present the entire Sunday evening performance in sign language. In addition, the Mid-America Singers offer the opportunity for interested persons to be "Patrons of the Feaste," combining an enriching and unique evening with a gift to the continuing production of the feastes and other performances by the group. For a Patron's Gift of \$75 or more, the donor

**USI THEATER PRODUCTION BRINGS OLD FRIENDS TOGETHER.** When USI Theater decided to do three American classics for the 1987-88 season, the director and his wife, **Dr. Douglas** and **Mrs. Laura Hubbell**, thought of an old friend from college days. They called **Mr. Robert Meadors** in Detroit, where he is a consultant with Thomas Cook Travel U.S.A., and asked if he'd like to be a guest director for the local production of "The Glass Menagerie." Meadors was very interested. It not only would mean getting back into theater, where he had spent many years of his life, but getting to spend some time in home territory. He is a native of Petersburg, Indiana, and aside from a visit seven years ago for a class reunion, has not made it back often since he left in 1951 to go to Indiana University. Meadors wasn't sure his employer would give him the time needed for casting and rehearsals. But the employer cooperated readily and Meadors has arrived and has rehearsals well under way for Tennessee Williams' first masterpiece.

USI Theater will present the classic at 8 p.m. Thursday-Saturday, December 3-4-5 and 10-11-12, and 2 p.m. on Sunday, December 6. The cast of four includes USI students **Mr. Tedd Klipsch**, **Ms. Lisa Hubbell**, and **Mr. Bill Hairston**, with Laura Hubbell as the mother, Amanda Wingfield. Lisa is the Hubbells' daughter, making the play to a large extent a family affair for old college buddies. Dr. Hubbell again will handle scenery and backstage arrangements.

The most unusual aspect of this is that Mr. Meadors has been confined to a wheelchair as a result of a viral infection 10 years ago that attacked his spinal cord. He had, from 1962 until 1980, been a civilian director for various U.S. military theater and musical programs in Baumholder, Nurnberg, Frankfurt, and Heidelberg, Germany. Mr. Meadors said they put together small variety shows that went on tour and also had permanent playhouses for regular productions. The USI Theater reminds him of the playhouse in Frankfurt. Mr. Meadors' health problems prompted his retirement in 1980, primarily because Europe was not "wheelchair friendly," he explained. He added that retirement "was wonderful for about three years, then I got bored." Extensive travel during his years in Germany made the travel business a natural attraction. He took a travel industry course and began interviewing, winding up with Thomas Cook in 1983. For those familiar with the hilly terrain surrounding USI Theater, Mr. Meadors points out that a ramp from the parking lot has made the theater "wheelchair friendly."

**MID-AMERICA SINGERS GOING TO DISNEY WORLD.** USI's Mid-America Singers have been selected by audition to perform at Disney World in Florida on Sunday, March 27, 1988, during "Magic Music Days." **Mrs. Sue Schriber**, USI music director, said they were selected on the basis of video and cassette tapes submitted for the audition. She said they will perform on the "Tomorrowland" stage, presenting a contemporary program of jazz, swing, gospel, and rock music.

**KAPPA DELTA PI CHRISTMAS CARD.** Kappa Delta Pi's annual Christmas scholarship campaign is under way. **USI INCLEMENT WEATHER CANCELLATION NOTICE.** Occasions when University functions will be cancelled will be extremely rare. Thus, even in severe weather -- heavy snow, ice storms, extreme cold -- the University's academic programs, courses, classes, and seminars will continue and administrative offices will remain open.

Even though inclement weather may result in hardship and inconvenience for students, faculty, and staff, the overall interests of the University are best served by keeping to the regular class schedule (day and night), except in the rarest circumstances. The primary consideration is the safety of students traveling to and from classes and conditions of area highways and city streets will be considered, along with campus conditions. The decision to cancel classes will be made by the Vice President for Academic Affairs. When such a decision is made, the following procedures will be observed:

- (A) All campus offices and departments will remain open and function on their normal schedules.
- (B) Members of the administrative and clerical/support staffs are expected to fulfill their University assignments.
- (C) Members of the faculty are expected to fulfill their responsibilities in pursuit of scholarship, in research activities, and in class preparation.

The decision to close administrative offices will be made by the University president. In that event, the departments which provide essential functions must continue to operate; departmental supervisors will be responsible for maintaining sufficient staff to accomplish these functions.
