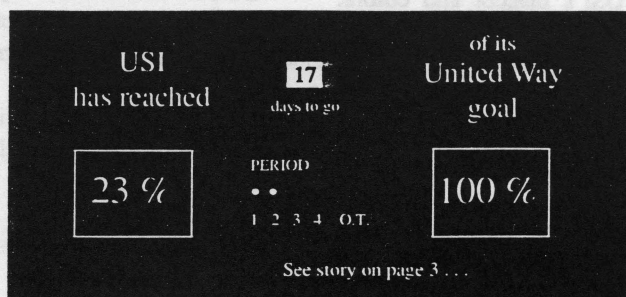

It is being coordinated by Dr. Joseph Palladino, USI psychology professor and former department chair who was co-author with Dr. Davis of the textbook, *Psychology*, due out in November.
