HONORS DAY PROGRAM. According to *ROBERT L. REID*, Vice President for Academic Affairs, it will be necessary to cancel classes which normally meet during the 11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. time block on Thursday, April 28 to enable students to attend and participate in Honors Day activities. The Honors Day Program, to be held in the Forum Room at 11:00 a.m., recognizes individuals and student organizations for academic ability and leadership during the 1976-77 academic

year.

It is hoped since April 28 is the last regular class period for the 11:00 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. Tuesday/Thursday classes, faculty will be able, with minimal inconvenience, to adjust their schedules to accommodate this annual event.

SECRETARIES WEEK MARKED. National Secretaries Week will be observed April 24-30. The first inroad for women into the world of business came in the late 1800's . . . with the new typing machines and a shortage of male workers. Previously, only 7 women in the entire U.S. held positions as stenographers. Then, in 1881, the YWCA in New York City pioneered a bold educational proposition--to educate and train 8 young women as Type-Writers. The 6-month free course was the first of its kind in the world and was critically described as "an obvious error in judgment by well-meaning but misguided ladies." By 1900, some 200,000 women held jobs as stenographers and typists, and by 1930, they numbered well over two million. Latest Department of Labor figures show approximately 11,500,000 women using office typewriters in the U.S. today, and they constitute 34 percent of the women's work force.

GARDEN PLOTS AVAILABLE. About 30 ISUE community garden plots are now available for this year. The garden plots, located west of the technology center, measure 40 by 25 feet. MID AMERICAS PERFORMING SATURDAY NIGHT, The Mid America Singers of Indiana State University Evansville are touring five Indiana towns this week. Included in the tour are the Indiana towns of Huntingburg, April 17; Madison, April 19; Lawrenceburg, April 20; Edinburg, April 21; and Greencastle, April 22.

Thirty-four students will be taking the tour with students from the singing group and the stage band.

The tour is being made possible by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts and the Indiana Arts Commission.

The Mid America Singers will be appearing in a "return show from tour" at ISUE on Saturday, April 23. The performance, to be presented in the Forum on campus at 8:00 p.m., will be a full show including popular show tunes, songs from current Broadway musicals, easy listening music, and a 1930's medley.

The Mid America Singers are directed by *JON CARLSON*, ISUE Director of Music.

Tickets for the April 23 show will be \$2.00 and may be purchased at the door.

ISUE STUDENT TABLE TENNIS FINALIST, *GARY GONNERMAN* of ISUE is one of the 16 table tennis finalists in the nation to be participating in the Table Tennis International Tournament to be held in Denver, Colorado April 21-24. The Association of College Unions-International (A.C.U.I.) is sponsoring the tournament. *GARY* is the Regional Table Tennis Champion representing Indiana, Kentucky, and Illinois.

ART EXHIBIT RUNS THROUGH APRIL 21, Three ISUE students received top honors in the 1977 Student Art Exhibit, which opened Sunday, April 10. **JAMES PARRENT**, Newburgh, received the Old National Bank "Best of Show" award for his painting "Boulder." This was a \$150 cash award. **BOB EMMERSON**, 716 S.E. First Street, was named "Most Outstanding Senior" for the show. This \$100 award was made possible by Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher Thorne-Thomsen. The other top award was a \$250 scholarship to a junior from the Artists Guild of Evansville which went to **NICK ZENTHOEFER**, 2463 W. Virginia.

One hundred seventy-five pieces were accepted into the show from over 255 submitted entries. Jerry Jackard of Indiana University judged the student show. Twenty-one students received special awards and scholarships.

The Student Art Exhibit will be on display through April 21 in the University Center.

HUMANITIES FORUM, Dr. John Wain, Fellow and Professor of Poetry at Brasenose College, Oxford University, England, will speak on "English Poetry in My Time" at 8:00 p.m. Wednesday, April 27 in Room A34.

Professor Wain has authored five volumes of poetry, four books of criticism and the first volume of an autobiography, Sprightly Running. In addition, he has published eight novels, the most recent being A Winter in the Hills (1970).

In the United States to address the annual meeting of the Johnson Society of the Central Region being held on the Terre Haute campus of Indiana State University April 29-30, Professor Wain is also the author of a 1974 biography of Samuel Johnson, the 18th century English man of letters.

Another event sponsored by the Humanities Forum will be the formal concert of the Evansville String Quartet to be held on Monday, April 25 at 8:00 p.m. in Room A34.

UNIVERSITY OBSERVES "SPRING WEEK," "Spring Week" is being held on the campus this week. Highlighting the events will be the annual bike race, "The Eagle Gran Prix" scheduled April 20 at 12 noon. Eleven men's teams and nine women's teams will be competing in the Eagle Gran Prix bicycle race.

Time trials for the race were held on April 16. Fastest time in the men's competition was posted by Sigma Tau Gamma with 1:07.6 followed by Phi Alpha II, 1:09.1. Holding the third place position will be Alpha Omega Psi, 1:11 and in fourth position, last year's winner, Chi Gamma Iota, 1:12.9. Riders compete on a 6/10 of a mile track in the ISUE parking lot. Men ride for a total of 32 miles.

The Sigma Tau Gamma Little Sisters placed first in the women's competition with 1:15.3. Second place position is held by Sigma Kappa, 1:19.5 and third place by Delta Zeta II, 1:19.6. The women will run a 6/10 of a mile track for a total of five miles.

"SPRING WEEK" CONTINUED. Opening ceremonies will begin at 12 noon with the women's race at 1:00 p.m., and the men's race at 1:45 p.m. Preliminary races featuring faculty/administration will also be held. The day has been named David L. Rice Day by the Student Union Board recognizing President Rice's support of student activities.

"Spring Week" is being sponsored by the ISUE Student Union Board. It offers students competitive fun events celebrating the Spring weather.

PEOPLE IN THE NEWS, *ROBERT E. MAYS*, Director of Student Teaching and Laboratory Experiences, was a guest speaker at the North Central Provincial Conference held April 1-3 at Fort Wayne, Indiana, and sponsored by Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity. The theme of the conference was Achievement Through Education. *DR. MAYS* presented both the Distinguished Alumnus and Outstanding Undergraduate awards. Also, *DR. MAYS* conducted two workshops at the Annual Spring Conference For Teacher Educators, which was held April 14-15 at Terre Haute. The workshops centered around pre-service training experiences, and were designed to give persons in teacher education a better understanding of the issues involved in early and continuous pre-service experiences.

ANDREW TERSHAK, Associate Professor of Engineering Technology, and *MICHAEL SAKELHAUS* and *TIM GILLEY*, both student officers of the ISUE Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers, attended the IEEE Southeastern Convention in Williamsburg, Virginia on April 4 and 5. The annual convention is designed to provide opportunities for electrical engineering students, professors, and practicing engineers to become acquainted with each other, see what educational paths are being pursued by fellow students, and to discover how the electrical engineer functions in various prominent companies.

MINING CONFERENCE AT EXECUTIVE INN, ISUE co-sponsored a National Mining Training and Development Conference April 18 through 20 at the Executive Inn. Other schools involved in sponsoring the conference were Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, and Wabash Valley College in cooperation with the Illinois Basin Coal Mining Manpower Council.

The Conference was designed to serve as a catalyst in bringing together representatives of governmental agencies, educational institutions, industry and business to discuss recognized trends and to review new developments in training programs prepared for and used by the mining industry.
