GRIMES HAUS TO BE DEDICATED. The dedication of the Paul Grimes Haus will be held on June 1 at the home site south of Westwood Lodge on the east side of campus. The Paul Grimes Haus is an early 1800's pioneer home which has been restored by members of the Westwood Garden Club. The club has been responsible for the development of the Bent Twig Outdoor Learning Environment, the Westwood Lodge, and the Breckinridge Cabin.

An American Revolution Bicentennial project, the Log Haus has been renovated to preserve early community heritage in a natural area to be utilized for outdoor education and recreation opportunities for youth groups and campus organizations.

The Posey County home was taken from 40 acres originally deeded to John Day on June 2, 1836. The property was deeded January 27, 1869 to John Orth and purchased in 1924 by Edward J. and Edith L. Orth Kuebler, parents of Clarence T. and Charles E. Kuebler. It was relocated on the campus in 1975 when it had to be cleared from the Kuebler property for highway right of way in Posey County.

The home is being dedicated as the Paul Grimes Haus in memory of ISUE's first physical plant superintendent.

The Paul Grimes Haus will be open for interested employees following the dedication at 2:00 p.m. on June 1.

NEW PHOTOCOPYING MACHINE INSTALLED IN COPY CENTER. A new photocopying machine has been installed in the Copy Center and is intended for single copies only of an original. The new machine makes first copies twice as fast as the other machine and also features automatic document feed, two-sided copying, and book copying. The automatic document feed will enable the operator to make single copies of several originals at a much higher speed. For example, on the new machine, a single copy of five originals can be run in 16.5 seconds; on the Xerox 2400, the same job would take 70 seconds. Auditrons will still be used on the new machine.

When two or more copies of an original are needed, they will be run by the Copy Center Operator on the Xerox 9200. A new pricing plan on the 9200 enables us to make two and up copies as cheaply as on the other machine. An auditron receptacle is on order for the 9200 and should be installed soon, eliminating the paper work for copying on the 9200.

With the high speed and efficiency of these two machines, it is hoped that better, faster service can be provided in the Copy Center.

NON-CREDIT SUMMER COURSES OFFERED. Popular courses such as beginning tennis, basic photography, and gymnastics, along with such new courses as collector's corner and garden gourmet round out the Indiana State University Evansville summer non-credit course

NON-CREDIT COURSES, CONTINUED, series being offered at the University in June, July and August. Twelve courses are being offered in the summer series.

New offerings and their starting dates are Rocks, June 15; Stamps, June 15; and Beer Can Collecting, June 15.

Designed as a learning experience for parents and children as a family unit, two new courses in astronomy and nature study will be offered beginning June 14 and June 16.

A course in how to prepare fresh garden vegetables will be offered over the lunch period from 11:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. starting August 3.

Other courses in the summer series and their beginning dates are Football Officiating, June 11; Beginning Tennis for adults, June 14, and Beginning Tennis for juniors, June 14; Basic Photography, June 14; Efficient Study Techniques, June 14; Needlepoint, June 14; Gymnastics for Competition, beginners and low intermediate, June 14 and high intermediate, June 16; Basic Drawing, ages 6 to 10, June 14 and ages 11 to 15, June 16; and Yoga for teens and adults, June 14.

Complete course descriptions are available through the Office of Continuing Education.

BIGHAM*, Associate Professor of History, provided information on genealogy and history and *JOSEPHINE M. ELLIOTT*, Archivist, supplied resources for family research in Southwestern Indiana.

Also serving as panelists in the forum for discussion of education in New Harmony were *GREGORY BROWN* and *BOB SPEAR*, ISUE students. Another panel discussion detailed archaeology in New Harmony and the excavation of David Dale Owen's second geological laboratory. It was chaired by *JOHN B. ELLIOTT*, ISUE Adjunct Lecturer and field director of the archaeology research in New Harmony. *MR. ELLIOTT* was assisted by *ROBERT E. HENN* and *GILBERT APFELSTADT*, field directors.

ATHLETIC DEPARTMENT SPONSORING SUMMER CAMPS. The ISUE Athletic Department is sponsoring basketball (men and women), volleyball and cheerleading camps this summer, in addition to an 8-game summer basketball league for grade school boys. All camps will take place at ISUE Arena.

ISUE Basketball Coach, *WAYNE BOULTINGHOUSE*, and Assistant Coach, *DON RAMSDEN*, will conduct the three-week basketball camp for boys, scheduled to begin June 13. The camp will run Monday through Thursday from 8:15 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. All participants in the camp should be 9 years of age or older. Any dependents of the ISUE administration, faculty or staff can attend the three-week camp for the reduced rate of \$15.00. The cost to the general public is \$40.00.

ISUE Women's Coach, *RUTH SCHWENK*, and *COACH BOULTINGHOUSE* will conduct a one week basketball camp for girls scheduled to begin Monday, June 20 from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. Cost of the week's camp is \$20.00.

A one week cheerleading camp will be administered by ISUE Cheerleading sponsor, *RUTH SCHWENK*. The cheerleading camp will start Monday, June 13 from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. through Friday, June 17. The fee is \$15.00.

The three week volleyball camp will begin on Monday, June 13 from 10:15 a.m. to noon. The camp will run Monday through Thursday and will be conducted by Ginger Lutterman, volleyball coach at Castle High School. The fee is \$30.00.

COACH BOULTINGHOUSE will also supervise an 8-game summer basketball league for grade school boys. The schedule will be announced once all the team rosters are completed. The league will run for four weeks and all the games played during the morning hours. League will commence the week of July 11. The fee for each player is \$15.00.

'DESK-R-CIZE'


Most office workers spend the majority of their working hours sitting down. Such inactivity leads to reduced circulation, earlier fatigue and the accumulation of muscle tension.

The Fitness Institute of Willowdale, Ontario, Canada, has designed a well-balanced exercise program that can be carried out without leaving your desk. Some of the exercises can even be done while sitting in your car (not driving!) or watching television.

These "desk-r-cizes" are suitable for men and women of all ages and all fitness levels, because you can proceed at your own speed. We will be featuring five of these during the summer months.

Good muscle tone and strength, a virgorous circulation and freedom from tension are the secrets of looking good, feeling good and working with energy and enthusiasm. With a little heave-ho and a smile, these armchair workouts will help you become a physically and psychologically fit worker.

Now, one, two, up -- and happy desk-r-cizing!



1. SEATED HIGH STRETCH & RELAX

Lifts and stretches rib cage while stretching upper body muscles, stimulating circulation and relieving muscle tension.

Slide chair back from desk. Clasp hands together, fingers interlaced, and place on top of your head. Sit upright in good posture with stomach held in and chest high. Breathe in and stretch both arms straight above the head as high as you can, keeping hands clasped with their backs facing the ceiling. Look up slightly as you stretch and hold the highest possible position for 3-5 seconds. Then exhale in a long, easy sigh as you let your hands come apart and arms slowly drop down in front of you until they are resting on your lap. As you do this, try to let go of all muscle tension in upper body, letting shoulders sag and head drop towards chest. Remain in this totally relaxed position for 3-5 seconds then return to a starting position and repeat. Do 6 times.
