FEDERALLY INSURED STUDENT LOAN WORKSHOP. The Indiana State University Evansville Office of Financial Aids is sponsoring a Federally Insured Student Loan Workshop on March 3, 1976 in the University Conference Center for lending institutions and area higher education institutions. Mr. Roy Fox of the U.S. Office of Education Region V will open the conference at 10:00 a.m., discussing claim procedures, determining student qualifications, and explaining whose responsibility it is that refunds are made when students withdraw. Ron Jackson, Loan Officer of Citizens National Bank, will be the afternoon speaker, discussing the lending institutions' perception of the program.

A panel of higher education representatives will discuss their procedures of determining eligibility of students, processing loan applications, and notifying lenders of graduation or withdrawal. Panel members will be Jim Dawson, University of Evansville Financial Aids Director; Glenn Wood, Ivy Tech Financial Aids Director; and *Susanna Chastain*, Administrative Assistant, ISUE Financial Aids Office.


PEOPLE IN THE NEWS.
