HOMECOMING WEEK. Homecoming Week begins Sunday, February 6 and continues through Saturday, February 12 at ISUE. The Student Union Board has planned an action-packed week for participants. Highlights of the week include a display contest, a lying contest, and the selection of the 1977 Homecoming Queen.

RECREATIONAL TOURNAMENTS HELD. Indiana State University Evansville is a member of the American College Unions International, which sponsors recreational tournaments. ISUE students competed in these tournaments on campus last week.

ISUE junior GARY FREEMAN won the campus Air Hockey Championship on January 23 and will represent ISUE in the Regional Intercollegiate Championships at SIU-Carbondale.

GARY and runner-up RANDY WOODALL, a junior will be competing in the Region 9 Tournaments on February 10, 11, 12 against some 40 plus champions from Indiana and Illinois schools.

The team of HOWARD WELLS, sophomore, and MARK HASSEL, sophomore, won the Table Soccer (Foosball) Championship January 23 and will represent ISUE in the Dynamo/ACU-1 Regional Intercollegiate championships.

HOWARD and MARK along with runners-up MIKE SNELLING, sophomore, and BRAD HENSON, freshman, will be competing in the Region 9 Tournament at SIU Carbondale on February 10, 11 and 12. Over 40 schools from Indiana and Illinois will be sending their champions to compete. The Regional winners will compete in face to face national competition at the Playboys Towers in Chicago.

Sophomore RUSTY HYNEMAN won the men's campus billiard championship on January 23 and will represent ISUE in the Pabst/ACU-1 Regional Intercollegiate Billiard Championship on February 10, 11, 12 at Southern Illinois University-Carbondale.

RECREATIONAL TOURNAMENTS, CONTINUED. *RUSTY* and runner-up *KENT GONNERMAN*, senior, will be competing in the Region 9 tournament with billiard champions from some 40 plus other Illinois and Indiana schools. The men's regional winners will go on to play in the National Tournament to be held at the University of South Carolina-Columbia. Competitors play 14.1 continuous generally called straight pool, with the men playing to 100 points.

The intercollegiate billiard tournaments are sponsored by the Association of College Unions - International in association with the Pabst Brewing Company.

JOANNE WILDT, sophomore, and *GARY GONNERMAN*, sophomore, won the women and men's singles Table Tennis Championship on January 23 and will represent ISUE in the ACU-1 Regional Intercollegiate competition at SIU-Carbondale, February 10, 11, and 12.

JOANNE, *GARY*, and runner-up *MIKE STEINER*, senior, will compete in the Region 9 Tournament with other table tennis champions from over forty schools in Indiana and Illinois. *GARY* and *MIKE* will also be defending their regional doubles championship won last year at Eastern Illinois University. The winner of the regional competition will go on to play in the national face to face competition at the University of Denver.

GARY SAMMET, junior, won the campus chess championship and will represent ISUE at the ACU-1 Regional Intercollegiate Championship.

GARY and runner-up *CLIFFORD JONES*, senior, will compete in the Region 9 Tournament against representatives from over forty schools in Indiana and Illinois.
