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ISUE WOMEN'S BASKETBALL TEAM GOES TO STATE CHAMPIONSHIP.

Last weekend, the ISUE women's basketball team, coached by RUTH SCHWENK, won the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women Southwest District Tournament by beating Oakland City in the first round and I.U. Southeast in the finals, making their record 14 wins and 5 losses.

The Eagles now advance to play in the Indiana Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women Large and Small College Basketball Championship which will be held March 1, 2, and 3 in Terre Haute. They meet St. Joseph at 8:00 p.m. Thursday night, and if they are successful they will play the winner of

the Goshen v. Marion game on Friday at 6:00 p.m. The State Championship game will be played Saturday at 1:00 p.m. If Coach Schwenk's Eagles emerge as champions, their next contest will be the Midwest Tournament in Kalamazoo, Michigan.

LIBRARY ADDS COMPUTER TERMINAL. Thanks to a special subsidy, Library Services has added a computer terminal to assist all interested library users in rapidly locating a wide variety of publications. This terminal, located in the Reference-Interlibrary loan office, L-202, is connected to a data base providing access to the bibliographic records of more than 4 million publications, including books and periodicals. (However, subject searching is not possible at this time.) The full or partial holdings of over 1,000 academic libraries, including ISUE, are represented in the rapidly growing data base.
