MELVIN DENNER, Professor of Life Science, "A Scientist Comments on Back to Basics"; and Dr. Stephen Scheer, St. Meinrad College, "Deconstructing Composition."

The program will be held in the University Center. Registration will open at 3:30 p.m. and continue until 9:00 p.m. The keynote address will be given at the Conference banquet which begins at 6:00 p.m.
