ASIA IN US exhibit comes to Evansville

As the first sponsor of this traveling exhibit, USI will hold the ribbon cutting and opening reception for ASIA IN US from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. Sunday, September 20, in Carter Hall.

ASIA IN US is an Indiana Humanities Council (IHC) statewide program, with support from Lilly Endowment, that highlights the ties between Indiana and Asia. This is a multifaceted program offering exhibitions, film series, readings, discussion groups, and entertainment integrated with public programs and projects.

Program chair Tom Wilhelmus, associate dean of the School of Liberal Arts, said, "This program is for anyone with an interest in Asia. It explores the way Asian people have influenced who we are and how dramatically they may influence us in the future."

The centerpiece is an interactive traveling exhibit that explores cross-cultural transplants among Asia, Indiana, and the US. The exhibit includes three computers with access to a simulated website of IHC's home page, <<http://www.ihc4u.org>>. The actual IHC home page is an online site which puts Hoosiers in touch with more than 70 links to other home pages on Asia, including extensive resources on China, Japan, Southeast Asia, and Asian American interests.

The goals of the program are to increase Hoosier awareness and understanding of our human ties to the rest of the world, specifically Asia; build local knowledge about and responsiveness to global perspectives in commerce, governance, culture, and education; and incorporate local community interests into the project as it travels throughout Indiana. Events are planned throughout Evansville while the exhibit is here including the following on campus:




Aaron Lee Cox

Children's Center:

The Children's Center has openings for children ages three to six years on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, full- or part-time, from 7 a.m. - 5 p.m. Afternoon hours are available on Tuesday and Thursday.

Because the Center is licensed to care for children through age seven, after-school and holiday care can be provided for children in Kindergarten. Handling University cash:

Pursuant to the directive of the University president, Dr. H. Ray Hoops, the only authorized agent to control, account for, and safeguard cash at the University of Southern Indiana is the Business Office. Specifically, this office is responsible for collecting fees and other income, making all fee refunds, preparing bank deposits, issuing petty cash disbursements, issuing change funds to authorized units, and assessing student fees.

Under no circumstances is an employee to accept money in the name of the University without properly recording the income with an official University receipt. A receipt will be issued by the Cashier's Office for all cash received, except for cash received by approved satellite operations.

Departments that have been approved to accept money are required to issue receipts and make daily deposits. These departments are responsible for maintaining their own receipt subsidiary record on forms that have been approved by the controller.

Loss of any funds should be reported IMMEDIATELY to the Cashier's Office and to the University Security Department. Questions on cash control procedures should be addressed to the bursar, ext. 1842.
