Web Tips: From "Schools" to "Colleges" By Ed Scharf, web developer

Editor's note: The University's academic units will be referred to as "Colleges" instead of "Schools" effective July 1, 2005. Web Developer Ed Scharf offers the following tips for University employees who deal with Web content. For more information, contact Scharf at 812/464-1999.

As anyone who walks past the library construction can attest, USI is undergoing some major changes. While most are ground-breaking, not all merit a shovel with a big red ribbon tied around the handle. Effective July 1, the five academic units on campus will undergo the change from "schools" to "colleges" without the need of forklifts or cranes. For those of us who maintain the school's presence on the World Wide Web, however, it is time to put on our hard hats and do a little digging.

Manned with our handy binocular, magnifying glass, or flashlight icons, we need to scour the USI Web site for mentions on our pages of "schools" and magically (as is everything we do on the Web) turn them into "colleges." Thankfully, the good people who developed FrontPage and Dreamweaver have included a "Find and Replace" function that does the bulk of the work for us.

If you have access to a Web folder, simply do the following:

- Open the folder in FrontPage or Dreamweaver
- From the "Edit" dropdown menu
- Look for "Find...," "Find and Replace," or you can simply hit "Ctrl+F" (construction workers use bulldozers, web develop ers use "Ctrl+F").
- Any of these options should open a small window that asks you where you'd like to search, what you'd like to find, and with what you'd like to replace it.

I suggest letting your computer find all the instances of "school of..." before you hastily hit the oh-so-tempting "Replace All" button. The usage and context of a phrase is rarely cut and dry. Some of your pages may reference the academic unit in ques-

tion prior to July 1, 2005 (most common in newsletters, archived articles, etc.). For instance, your Web folder might contain an archived newsletter article that references an alum who donated money to the School of Business in 2001. Those pages should not be changed.

So while "Ctrl+F" may work like a virtual bulldozer, you may want to take a bit more care with your Web page excavation to insure that your pages, and the USI site as whole, remain current, clear, and consistent. It may be a little more work, but I can guarantee you won't end up with dirt under your fingernails.

Perry claims USI women's second national title

Sophomore **Candace Perry** of Anderson, Indiana, became the second women's competitor in USI history to win a national championship Thursday as she took home the crown in the long jump at the NCAA Division II Outdoor Track and Field Championships in Abilene, Texas.

Perry's third-round leap of 20 feet, 3.75 inches was half a foot better than that of the second-place performer and elevated the now four-time All-American into elite status. Perry, who was less than an inch away from winning the national championship as a freshman last season, joins junior **Heather Cooksey** of Brownsburg, Indiana, as the only women in any sport at USI to win a national championship.

She also joins former men's competitor $Elly\ Rono$ and the 1995 men's basketball team on USI's all-time list of national championships.

"I actually knew that I won before the final results came out," Perry said. "There was only one person that had a chance to beat me and she jumped before me in the finals. After her jump I asked the judged what she jumped and she said '19-six.' I shook my head and realized then that I was a national champion.

"I was pretty excited when I won," Perry continued, "but I don't know if it has hit me yet."

Perry has jumped 20 feet or better three times this season, with her season-best of 20-feet, 4.5 inches coming at the GLVC Championships the first weekend of May. She finished third at the NCAA II Indoor Championships in March.

Cooksey and senior **Crystal Stock** of Mount Vernon, Indiana, qualified for Friday's 3, 000-meter finals. Cooksey, the defending national champion in the event, ran the prelims in nine minutes, 59.06 seconds, while Stock finished in 10 minutes, 0.03 seconds.

Sophomore **Missy Burgin** of Sellersburg, Indiana, finished 15th in the 3,000-meter steeplechase prelims and did not qualify for Saturday's finals.

Berlin and Hart's "As Thousands Cheer" musical revue opens The New Harmony Theatre's 2005 season

With music and lyrics by Irving Berlin and sketches by Moss Hart, As Thousands Cheer was the hit musical of the 1933 Broadway season. The fast-paced revue opens The New Harmony Theatre's 2005 season Friday, June 10. Its light-hearted take on tabloid journalism and the American obsession with celebrity is

no less topical – or hilarious – in 2005 than it was in Depressionera New York.

As Thousands Cheer combines some of Berlin's greatest songs, including "Easter Parade," "Heat Wave," and "Suppertime," with Hart's sharp and witty sketches in an innovative newspaper format, with headlines 'such as "Prince of Wales Engaged," "Rockefellers Build Radio City," and "Josephine Baker in Paris." Stars of the 1930's romp through the headlines, and no page is left unturned: Hart's topics range from world affairs to photos of the rich and famous, from comic strips and the weather page to advice for the loyelorn.

Of a 1998 Drama Dept. revival, *Playbill* wrote: "Moss and Berlin's satirical look at publicity-hungry people who manipulate their public image may have been written in 1933, but it certainly looked as if it were written in 1998 and, we wager, will look contemporary far into the future."

Berlin's song, "Through A Keyhole" bears that out with a lyric that perfectly applies to 21st century tabloid journalism: "If you'd like to get the in on the latest bit of sin, have a look/Life is like an open book through a keyhole/If you'd like to get a view, view of who is cheating who, have a look..."

"It was Hart's idea to exploit the newspaper and tabloid fever of the day," Artistic Director **Scott LaFeber** writes in his program notes. "Berlin happily agreed and the show, today, displays both men's genius – not only for great writing and songs, but supporting that common cliché, "The more things change, the more they stay the same."

The ensemble cast includes **Dennis Clark**, **Taryn Eisenberg**, **Markeisha Ensley**, **Aaron Kaburick**, and **Glenn White**. This is White's third season at The New Harmony Theatre. Audiences will remember him from NHT's popular production of Godspell in 2001. He and the rest of the cast will portray Depression-era personalities such as Joan Crawford, Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., Mahatma Gandhi, socialite Barbara Hutton, and President Herbert Hoover.

Music director and pianist **James Bassi**, scenic designer **Mary Kay Samouce**, costume designer **Shan Jensen**, light designer **Jessica Trundy**, sound designer Andrew Moberley, and production stage manager **Sarah Bierenbaum** make up the artistic team.

Production underwriting for As Thousands Cheer was provided by Fifth Third Bank. Earl S. and Bridget M. McDaniel provided underwriting for ensemble member White. Antislavery expert to speak at the second annual Lincoln Institute for Teachers

An expert in African-American antislavery history, Richard J.M. Blackett, will discuss Abraham Lincoln and race at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, June 16, in Carter Hall, in the University Center. The

lecture, part of Historic Southern Indiana's second annual Lincoln Institute for Teachers workshop, is free and open to the public.

Blackett is the Andrew Jackson professor of history at Vanderbilt University. He specializes in 19th century American history, specifically the study of African American antislavery history, as well as the history of the Caribbean.

He is the author of several books about nineteenth-century history, including Thomas Morris Chester: Black Civil War Correspondent. His most recent book, Divided Hearts: Britain and the American Civil War, looks at popular reactions to the war in Britain and what impact they had on the struggle for political reform. He is currently at work on a study of the ways northern communities organized to resist the enforcement of the 1850 Fugitive Slave Law.

Born in Trinidad and educated in England, he was professor of history and adjunct professor of Afro-American studies at Indiana University, and the editor of the Indiana Magazine of History, before accepting a position as the John and Rebecca Moores Distinguished Chair of History and African American Studies at the University of Houston. He is currently director of Graduate Studies at Vanderbilt, as well as a history professor.

The Lincoln Institute for Teachers, to be held annually until the bicentennial of Lincoln's birth in 2009, attracts teachers from all grade levels and disciplines, with a different theme each year. The 2005 workshop will explore Lincoln, race, and the Underground Railroad. Teachers attending the workshop will be led on guided tours of Underground Railroad sites in Evansville.

The workshop will be held June 16-17 on the USI campus. Blackett will give the keynote address, during which he will discuss teaching about race in the Ohio Valley in the 1850s. Keith Griffler, professor of African American studies at the University of Cincinnati, will discuss myths, legends, and facts about the Underground Railroad. Barbara Tagger, southeast region coordinator of the National Park Service's National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom Program, will provide information on that program and its mission.

Two presenters from last year's institute will be returning: James Percoco, master teacher at West Springfield High School in Springfield, Virginia, and Martha Beckort, media specialist at Lanesville Community School Corporation. Percoco will discuss teaching about race in the classroom and Beckort will review online and print teaching resources related to the topic.
