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HUMANITIES SERIES TO FEATURE KARL HAAS. Mr. Karl Haas, whose "Adventures in Good Music" is heard on National Public Radio by millions of music lovers throughout the world, will headline a series of special programs to be offered for students and the community this spring by the University of Southern Indiana Division of Humanities. Mr. Haas, a concert pianist, will visit the campus and New Harmony on Thursday and Friday, March 19-20, as USI's 1987 Enlow Distinguished Scholar. He will present lecture-performances on campus and a recital at Murphy Auditorium.

The series opens Tuesday, March 3, when **Ms. Ellen Lanyon** and **Mr. Roland Ginzel**, painters and printmakers, will be guests for the Visiting Artists program at USI and New Harmony. Ms. Lanyon is an award-winning artist who has been adjunct associate professor of painting at Cooper Union. Mr. Ginzel is a former art educator who studied in Rome under a Fulbright Fellowship.

Dr. Eileen Bender, assistant dean of faculties and associate professor of English at Indiana University-South Bend, will lecture on the uses of food in literature in programs at USI and McCullough Library at Washington Square on Thursday, April 2.

In early April (date still undecided), **Mr. Philip Hagemann**, a Posey County native who is a composer and conductor now living in Manhattan, will return to present two one-act operas -- a new arrangement and English translation of Debussy's "The Prodigal Son" and an original opera by Mr. Hagemann, an adaptation of George Bernard Shaw's one-act play, "The Six of Calais."

Mr. Franz Schulze, an educator and art critic and historian, will lecture on "American Architecture: The Rise of the Skyscraper," on Thursday, April 16, at the Atheneum in New Harmony.

A poetry reading on Thursday, April 30, by **Ms. Bettie Sellers**, Goolsby Professor of English at Young Harris College, will close the series. Ms. Sellers has been active in various humanities and poetry organizations in Georgia.

Two related presentations will add to the Humanities Celebration. The USI Theatre's spring production, J. B. Priestly's mystery, "Dangerous Corner," will be presented Friday-Sunday, February 27-March 1 and March 6-8 at the USI Playhouse on Igleheart Avenue, while the annual Student Art Show will open Sunday, April 19, in the University Conference Center.

All programs are free except the concert by Mr. Haas, the operas by Mr. Hagemann, and the USI Theatre production. In addition to the Enlow Distinguished Scholar funding, the program series is being supported by the USI Foundation, New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art, and the Indiana Committee for the Humanities.

The series is the Division of Humanities contribution to the USI Community of Scholars programs that bring noted scholars and artistic talents to the campus to provide the opportunity for intellectual and cultural experience beyond the classroom for both the students and the community. The series is being coordinated by **Dr. James Blevins**, chairman of the Division of Humanities, **Dr. Sherry Darrell**, associate professor of English, **Mr. Matthew Graham**, assistant professor of English, and **Ms. Kathryn Waters**, assistant professor of art. DISTINGUISHED PROFESSOR LECTURE. **Dr. Wanda Best Hibbitts**, professor of business at USI, will present the Distinguished Professor Lecture at 3 p.m. Friday, February 20, in Forum I. Her topic will be "Higher Education and the Kondratieff Wave" -- a 50-year economic cycle first theorized by a Russian economist, **Mr. Nakoli Kondratieff**, dealing with various relationships to socioeconomic, political, and higher education events. A wine and cheese reception will follow the lecture. Dr. Hibbitts was selected for the 1986 National City Bank Distinguished Professor Award, a recognition for faculty who have demonstrated a dedication to teaching and a quest for excellence. It is supported by a \$1,000 grant from National City Bank. Dr. Hibbitts has been with the USI faculty since 1970 and plans to retire at the end of this semester.

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PRESIDENT'S MEDAL

The President's Medal will be presented for the fourth time during the 1987 Honors Day ceremony. The award will be given to a graduating senior who has demonstrated a commitment toward excellence on the academic level as well as in service to the University and the community. Information and supporting material already has been sent to students who qualify academically. Applicants must have a grade point average of at least 3.70, they must have completed at least 75 hours at the University of Southern Indiana at the time of application, and they must have applied for graduation. Applicants should send three letters of recommendation which attest to character as well as achievements to Mr. Larry Goss, chairperson of the Student Academic Affairs Committee. Two of the letters should come from faculty members (one from the student's division is recommended), and one from a personal source. The letter should include an evaluation of the student based on the following criteria:

- (a) **Character** -- integrity, honesty, professionalism, maturity;
- (b) **Accomplishments** -- both important achievements and significant endeavors;
- (c) **Service** -- to the University and the community; and
- (d) **Promise** -- not only for succeeding in career or graduate studies, but also (and perhaps most important) for serving one's fellow man.

Applications should be submitted by March 20. The Student Academic Affairs Committee will conduct personal interviews with the leading candidates and select a recipient. The committee chairperson will notify the President's Office, which will notify the student of the award.

LIBERAL ARTS AWARD

The Liberal Arts Award, to be presented for the sixth year, is committed to recognizing and promoting the ideals of liberal learning and the pursuit of excellence in (a) academic achievement in the liberal arts and sciences, (b) a noteworthy adherence to those virtues that mark a person of integrity, and (c) the pursuit of excellence in physical activities. Award criteria require that a candidate:

1. Must be at least a junior and enrolled as a full-time student at the time the recommendation is made.
2. May be a major in any degree-granting program at the University. (Students are not disqualified by virtue of their professional and vocational goals. They are qualified by virtue of the overall integrity of their student life.)
3. Will have demonstrated achievement in reading, writing, and mathematics, and a well-balanced, well-sequenced involvement in those areas constituting the liberal arts and sciences.
4. Will be asked to write and submit an essay on a topic related to liberal learning.
5. Should be a well-balanced individual, exemplified in mind, character, and body.

All faculty are asked to encourage qualified students from all academic divisions to apply. A dossier -- including relevant materials such as letters of nomination and/or endorsement, transcript, vita, testimonials, and any other materials the candidate deems applicable -- should be submitted no later than March 20 to Mr. Larry Goss, chairperson of the Student Academic Affairs Committee, which will evaluate the applicants.
