PURDUE PROFESSOR TO ADDRESS RESEARCH CONFERENCE. Dr. Kay Deaux, professor of psychological sciences at Purdue University, will be guest lecturer at the second annual Tri-State Undergraduate Psychology Research Conference to be held at Indiana State University Evansville on Saturday, April 16. Last year's initial conference was the most successful first-year conference of its kind, attracting 20 papers from students in three states.

"The Behavior of Women and Men: Questions, Answers and Puzzles from a Decade of Research" will be presented by Dr. Deaux in the early afternoon. Dr. Deaux, who holds a Ph.D. in social psychology from the University of Texas, has spent several years researching sex roles, their similarities and differences, and social cognition: stereotypes and attribution processes. Subsequently, she is a scholar in her field as the author of three books, several textbook chapters, and numerous articles in professional journals. She serves as consulting editor, member of editorial boards, and reviewer of several psychology journals: Journal of Personality and Social Psychology, Journal of Applied Social Psychology, Sex Roles, and Journal of Personality to name a few.

Ms. Jeter, who performs frequently in four-hand and two-piano recitals with Hatfield, is a well-known keyboard artist and director of special programs, UE's College of Alternative Programs.
