Evansville Factbook 1994-95 published by School of Business

The USI School of Business has released the 1994-95 version of *The Evansville Factbook*, a publication designed to provide researchers and economic development officials with an easy-access profile of the economy of Evansville and southwestern Indiana.

The Factbook was initiated in 1992 by Dr. Munir Quddus, associate professor of economics, using Extended University Program support funded by a Lilly Endowment grant. Updated annually by USI economists to include the most recent data from primary and secondary sources, it provides the most comprehensive, up-to-date statistics available on the greater Evansville economy.

Subjects covered in *The Factbook* are: airport traffic, agriculture, banking, building permits, climate, education, health, household income, housing, labor force and wages, manufacturing, income

and proverty statistics, population, telephone services, service industries, spending patterns, utility consumption, vital statistics, and welfare expenditures.

The book for the first time includes these innovations: statistics available in worksheet format on a diskette; expanded descriptive profile of the City of Evansville; directory of sources for further research help; local government finance data at the county level; and one-page profile sheets of the City of Evansville, the Evansville MSA, and each of the six counties covered in detail.

Copies of *The Factbook* may be ordered from the USI School of Business, extension 1979. Individual copies are \$30, or \$25 each in a multiple-copy order; a diskette with data on Lotus 123 worksheets is available for an additional \$10 (it will not be sold separately).

The spring series is funded through the Crossroads of Culture: Mexico in the 20th Century international awareness project of the Indiana Humanities Council.
