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**WOMEN IN GOVERNMENT.** Congresswoman Shirley Chisholm, the first black Congresswoman in the United States, and Marilou Wetzler, Reporter for the Indiana State Supreme Court and Court of Appeals, will be keynote speakers for the Women in Government program. at ISUE on Friday, February 3 and Thursday, February 9 beginning at 7:30 p.m.

The program is being presented in two segments. Chisholm will speak on Friday, February 3 in A126 and Wetzler will give an address Thursday, February 9 in UC350.

In addition to the keynote addresses, faculty members from the humanities will present short discussions of the history and philosophy of women in government, and local governmental and political figures will participate in panel discussions.

One of the purposes of the program is to examine women's past, present, and future roles in influencing public policy. According to SYLVIA WEINZAPFEL, Coordinator of Programs for Women, "We hope this program will influence women to take a look at the very real possibility of their holding office--not only elective office, but the important opportunity to serve in appointive posts at all levels of government. By hearing from those who have taken part in the elective process, and by learning about the history and philosophy of women in government from humanist professors, we hope to impart an understanding of what has gone before us and of what lies ahead for women in government."

The sessions are free and open to the public. Sponsored by the Office of Continuing Education, the program is funded in part by the Indiana Committee for the Humanities and is co-sponsored by the Vanderburgh County Democrat Women's organization, the Vanderburgh County Republican Women's organization, and the League of Women Voters of Southwestern Indiana.

**DENTAL CARE EXPANDED.** The Division of Allied Health will be adding an experimental training phase to one of their regularly scheduled classes this spring semester. The Dental Hygiene students will be taught the fundamentals of placing tooth restorations (fillings) in certain selected patients. Some limited simple removable partial dentures and a few full dentures will be worked with.

Prospective patients will be screened on Tuesday and Thursday of each week during the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon. Adult patients and children over the age of 12 are preferred because the Allied Health students will be in a training phase and will not have the expertise at this time to handle small children.

A nominal fee will be charged for the procedures. These fees will be the same as those used at the I.U. School of Dentistry and will be over and above those charges usually made for the Dental Hygiene Clinic since this is a separate service.

Members of the University community are urged to participate. All work will be done under the direct supervision of a licensed dentist. This service, initially for one semester only, is also available to residents in the Evansville area. This service will not

**WINTER NONCREDIT COURSES.** The Office of Continuing Education is offering 23 noncredit courses in its winter series.

New noncredit courses offered include Don't Count Me Out Math, Racquetball, CPA Law Review, Community Forum: Environmental Problems and Solutions, Discussions in Literature: Images of Love, and Sending Your Kids to College. Two daytime classes added are Business Update for Women and Needlepoint. The Children's Center is available to children of parents taking daytime noncredit courses.

Weekend courses include a Children's Art Workshop: Communicating Through the Arts offered on Saturdays, an Assertiveness Training Workshop, and a five day trip in February to Los Angeles, to see the King Tut exhibit and other area attractions.

Classes being repeated this winter are Small Gasoline Engine Maintenance and Repair, Basic Photography, New Directions for Women, Estate Planning, Reading Efficiency, Beginning Drawing, Amateur Radio Novice Licensing Preparation, Age Group Gymnastics (students 6-14), Weaving, Yoga, and Ceramics Workshop: Raku Methods and Firing.
