USI LICENSE PLATE DEADLINE NEAR

The USI Alumni Association is offering a plate with the University logo and colors under a program initiated by the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles, and must have an initial order of 200 plates by August 1 to qualify.

Application forms are available in the Alumni Affairs Office. USI alumni, staff, students, and friends may reserve plates through November 1 by making a \$25 tax-deductible restricted contribution (per plate) to the USI Alumni Scholarship Endowment.

Certified applications will be returned to applicants by December 1 and should be presented with registration forms in acquiring plates, which will be available in license branch offices after January 1. A \$10 processing fee will be added to normal registration fees and taxes.
