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DR. DANIEL TO SPEAK AT PSYCHOLOGY CONFERENCE. Dr. Robert S. Daniel, professor emeritus at the University of Missouri, will be the featured speaker Saturday morning, April 13, in the main session of the Fourth Annual Mid-America Undergraduate Psychology Research Conference (formerly the Tri-State UPRC) in the University Conference Center. Dr. Daniel will discuss "The Teaching of Psychology: Reflections of an Editor and Teacher."

The conference will get under way at 8:30 a.m. Saturday, with registration. Student presentations will start at 9 a.m. There will be a moderately priced buffet luncheon. A reception will be held at 7 p.m. Friday, April 12, in the conference center for early-arriving participants. For further information, call Dr. Joseph J. James M. Goen, director of Indiana Green Thumb (and brother-in-law of Judy Goen, administrative assistant to the president), said one of the more than 400 state projects and workers is selected each month for recognition of excellent performance on the job and assisting in the effort to improve the quality of the community and lifestyle for Hoosier residents. ISUE Green Thumb participants are involved in carpentry and maintenance activity around the campus, work that would be left undone if they were not there.

Green Thumb, Inc. is a community service employment program funded by the Department of Labor and sponsored by the National Farmers Union. It provides part-time work for low-income persons aged 55 and over at tax-supported institutions or nonprofit organizations. At ISUE, these workers are a great asset and would be greatly missed if they were gone.

DR. SUSAN WOLFE TO SPEAK AT HUMANITIES FORUM. Dr. Susan Smith Wolfe, a lecturer in ISUE's Division of Humanities, will be the featured speaker for a Humanities Forum at 1 p.m. Tuesday, April 9. She will speak on the evolution of the "Grotesque" in art and literature, with particular emphasis on its emergence in Germany. She also will demonstrate how recent experiments in the German-speaking theatre have added a new dimension to the "Grotesque," illustrating the presentation through slides and selected readings.

Dr. Wolfe came to ISUE from Washington State University in Pullman, where she and her husband -- Dr. Donald S. Wolfe, assistant professor of German at ISUE -- were both full-time faculty in the German Department. She received her Ph.D. from the University of Oregon, with a specialty in 19th and 20th century German drama. She also holds master's degrees in French and German literature. She currently teaches the upper division courses in German at ISUE and is working with her husband to build the ISUE German program.

Pitzer, professor of history, presented a paper to the fifth annual meeting of the Indiana Association of Historians at Indiana State University in Terre Haute on March 30. His paper was entitled "Progressive Education for Social Change in American Communal Utopias."

Keith Benedict, a junior mechanical engineering technology student, placed second in the American Society of Mechanical Engineers Old Guard Contest March 28-30 at Tri-State University, Angola, Indiana. Twenty-five engineering students from universities in ASME Region VI (Wisconsin, Illinois, Kentucky, Michigan and Indiana) participated in the contest. Keith's 15-minute presentation, entitled "A Simple Multi-Purpose Threading Tool for Low Volume Production," received second-best assessment from the six judges. 
